Outdoor Adventure Learning

Helps Students Connect with Nature

A key element to raising students who will protect and care for the environment is helping them connect with nature. With pervasive screen use, urban living and the heavy pace of academics, students have little opportunity to experience the natural world. To help them connect to nature, themselves and each other, a new outdoor adventure and environmental learning program has been created at RC.

"It is our responsibility to create a positive shift in school culture towards students becoming more active in environmental issues," says Head of Adventure and Environmental Learning and PE teacher Kieran Pearson. "Current generations of students are becoming more and

more separated from the natural world, and this situation must be reversed if young people are to have any chance of falling back in love with, and therefore preserving nature."

Pearson interweaves his experience as a green beret into his lessons. "High challenge and working outside of your comfort zone, while at the same time learning lots of valuable skills, is the approach and philosophy of our program."

The first student camping and activities trip took place in the fall. Students learned camp craft skills and took part in a challenging high ropes course, orienteering, a forest zip coaster and a night hike. As the

year moves forward and the program develops, Pearson is planning trips to Uludağ mountain, treks on the Lycian Way and a multi-activity trip to Cappadocia, with each trip including high levels of adventure, challenge and reward.

RC Business Society Members Get a Head Start

The Robert College Business Society was founded in 2014 by RC 15 students Törehan Çağrı Kara, Canberk Koparal and Fırat Geyik. The plan was to link to the old Robert College Business Society that had existed in the 1950s and 1960s and which had continued at Boğaziçi University. While the club initially connected to Boğaziçi, over time the Business Society has morphed into what it has become today: a venue for discussions and presentations, visits to companies,

and the famous "Heritage Room Talks" in which speakers engage in a conversation with members of the club and other interested students. The club also has an intermittent publication, The Boss.

Over the years, the venues visited have ranged from Merrill Lynch - Bank of America to Eczacıbaşı Holding to the most recent visits, Akbank's Headquarters and Tekfen Holding. During each visit, students have been

able to interact directly with members of the company's leadership, often including RC graduates such as the CEO of Akbank, Hakan Binbaşgil RC 79. Visits have been complemented by Heritage Room Talks, the most recent with Ozan Korman Tarman RC 90 from Deutsche Bank.

The students get a great deal out of the club with one saying, "What we do in the Robert College Business Society is not only about finance. We also aim to gain familiarity with professional life and working environments. With our frequent trips, we get to see what being part of a management team might look like. Also, during our club sessions we do presentations in English, which helps members get familiar with formal language and economics terms."

Overall, RCBS acts as a venue for its 35 members to explore a future that likely awaits them.

After a two-year hiatus, the RCSummer and RCS Academy programs returned, with a record number of participants. The theme for the 2022 program was "In It Together," and kids aged 8-16 were excited to be able to join inspiring activities with friends again on campus.

RCSummer hosted more than 640 participants ages 8-14 who enjoyed the RC campus and special off-campus activities including a beach trip, a hiking trip, campouts and community exploration. It was a great opportunity to hone their English skills

while living the values of the program: honesty, empathy for one another, sportsmanship and the caring of others and the environment. They also gained many skills from over 100 activities that were offered by the counselors, in addition to various special events. Participants were introduced to new sports and had a chance to challenge themselves.

The nearly 200 RCS Academy participants, ages 12-16, were able to practice their English as well as expand their interest in different areas covering technology, math,

the humanities, art and drama. Ten courses were offered by RC faculty members and co-curricular advisers, which gave participants a head-start in a variety of fields. The courses included: A Gentle Introduction to Artificial Intelligence, Future Life: An Experience-based VR Journey, Cryptography: The Math of Secret Codes – HYB, Fine Arts 101, Drama Academy and Outdoor Leadership Training & Adventure.

RC CIP Project

Puts the Lens on Climate Change



RC students worked with students from Avanos Anadolu Lisesi

During the 2022 fall break a group of RC students went to Avanos to explore the issue of climate change via the CIP project Climate Change Through Our Lenses. The students had planned the project for several months and worked with students at Avanos Anadolu Lisesi. The aim was to discuss, examine and learn about the causes and effects of climate change.

The group arrived at their destination by train and bus, a trip that proved to be bonding. They stayed in Avanos for six days and became a well-integrated team with the Avanos students, sharing feedback about the different parts of the project. Amid the busy schedule,

they had activities like debate and Model United Nations on climate change, discussions, trips to nearby sites, and photography sessions to document the effects of climate change. They also collected garbage and sent it to be recycled.

The students say that the experience led them to question their daily routines that silently affect the environment. Critical thinking and exploration were an important part of the experience which helped them develop self-control connected to nature.

Commenting on their experience, students Hasan Mert Özarslan L10 and Begüm Mustu L11 recall striking

details: “During our journey in Avanos, we were able to see a lot of different effects of climate change. The one that caught our attention the most was the drought. We learned from the locals that the river that goes through Avanos had a lot more water than it does now. They said that the water levels reach the town in winter. The reason why it doesn’t have that much water was the lack of rain and water in Avanos. Over the years, Avanos started to get less and less rain. They told us that in the fall, they usually have snow, however when we were there, there wasn’t even rain. Throughout our project, we saw a lot of empty and dry rivers that passed through the town. Seeing these and taking photos was a really different experience.”

The student photos were exhibited on the poster panels at Avanos Anadolu Lisesi: “We grouped the photos in different documents according to their subject and printed out QR codes for each one. We also wrote a small description of the activities we did and our thoughts about the subjects. There was also a main panel that included a manifesto where we wrote about why we did this project and our reflections and thoughts about it.” The students hope to create the same exhibition at RC soon, to inspire other students to become part of the change.

One RC athlete pairs up with one special athlete to form a unique sub-team within the team. They keep each other focused, and they listen to and

Welcome to the USA Awards Turn 30

For three decades, new RC graduates attending college in the US have had the opportunity to receive an extra boost, courtesy of the Robert College Alumni Association of America (RCAAA). Founded in 1959, RCAAA's main goal is to support the RC community by keeping alumni and friends in touch with the school and one another, as well as by supporting the efforts of Robert College Trustees. The Welcome to the USA Awards started in 1993 to help ease RC students' transition into their first year of college by providing select incoming university freshmen with a "happy landing check". Since then, over 100 young alumni have benefited from the award.

RCAAA President Cengiz Hatiboğlu RC 81 explains that the awards are given to students who are in need and who have strong academic achievement: "Every year we receive the applications around April via the tremendous help of RC's College Counseling Office. When it's time to pick the awardees, our selection committee is faced with the most daunting task. The applicants have such great resumes and achievements in their young lives

that we feel each and every one of them deserve the award."

Tamara Türeli and Merve Ashaboğlu RC 91, co-directors of the RC College Counseling Office (CCO), are delighted to work closely with RCAAA helping with the facilitation of the Welcome to the USA Award application process: "The enthusiasm and dedication the RCAAA board shows to RC and its young graduates, and the time they put into this program are inspiring. The process has worked smoothly for many years: Students who've completed a short application ask their counselors to submit a recommendation with their insights for the RCAAA's review. With many qualified applicants who'd be wonderful ambassadors of RC in the States, we appreciate how hard it must be for the final selections to be made. The monetary award attached to the RCAAA recognition has allowed many of our scholarship students to subsidize various costs associated with moving abroad."

Many of the past recipients of this award are well into their successful careers in the US. Övül Sezer RC 06 recalls being a recipient of Welcome to USA Awards as one of the finest

memories of her first year in the US: "Being recognized for this award at the RC graduation ceremony and sharing it with a few of my classmates was a wonderful moment. As a new graduate, it gave me a great feeling that there is an amazing RC Community in the US through RCAAA. The award was very helpful. I got a new computer, printer, and similar things with this award to create my workstation at my freshman dorm. More importantly, this award also taught me how I am part of a much bigger family. I am in my 16th year in the US, and anytime I show up at an RCAAA Bar Night or Brunch, I still see the same amazing family I found far away from Istanbul."

To mark the 30th year, RCAAA increased the number of awards given from 3-4 in past years to 8 this year. Hatiboğlu states, "This past year we felt we needed to support more students as economic conditions in Turkey became more challenging." The increase in the number of recipients in the 30th anniversary befits the wonderful spirit with which the award was set up and which continues to make students feel supported by the RC community.

Şirin Tekinay RC 85 Wins Prestigious Engineering Education Award

SEFI, the European Society for Engineering Education, is the oldest and globally largest network of collaboration in engineering academe. The SEFI Fellowship Award recognizes meritorious service to engineering education worldwide, and Prof. Şirin Tekinay is among the recipients this year - the first Turkish person to receive this accolade. Tekinay has participated in all aspects of higher education, as a professor, dean, vice rector, and rector. She has also been the president of Global Engineering Deans Council and a board member of European Society for Engineering Education.

Tekinay sees engineering as a tool to solve global issues: "The to-do list to make life on Earth sustainable, healthy, safe, and joyful is captured in the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. The list includes

complex challenges in need of multidisciplinary solutions all with social, economic, and environmental components. Myopic piecemeal, short-term solutions that don't consider the high complexity of interactions within and among social, natural, and human-made systems have caused more

problems. Therefore, even those that sound like social issues to ears trained in disciplinary silos of the 20th century, like how to combat poverty, hunger, gender inequality and inequality in general, require engineering methods and tools to converge on timely and sustainable solutions."

Tekinay holds dear the goal of re-defining professional identity to be inclusive of all kinds of diversity, e.g., disciplinary, generational and gender: "Engineering education, globally, is suffering from a lack of full participation, especially of girls, access to advanced tools, and full support from governments, and employers. For over a decade now, I have been working on morphing engineering education towards a student-led, convergence and problem-based, technology-supported, design-oriented system."

RC Friends Find Success with Agave Games

Oğuzhan Merdivenli RC 14 jumped into the mobile gaming industry in 2018 and quickly convinced Burak Kar RC 15 and Baran Terzioğlu RC 14 to do the same, seeing the sector's potential. A few years down the line in 2021, Alper Öner RC 15, who was working in consulting in the US at the time and Merdivenli brewed up the idea of Agave Games, as Öner relates: "Ulaş Nuhoglu, a software engineer from RC 13, joined the team a few months after founding the studio. Later, we convinced Emir Kotil RC 15 to join us as well, who was someone we had wanted from the start. Burak and Baran, who were impressed by the ambition and progress that we achieved in the time between, finally started to seriously consider moving to Agave. After adding them as co-founders, we now have no doubts that we could be a global leader in the industry."

500 Istanbul, of which another RC alumnus Rina Onur Şirinoğlu RC L3 04 is a partner, proved to be the right address for fund raising given their vision, mentorship, and global connections. Agave Games received \$7 million from 500 Istanbul, Felix Capital,

and Balderton Capital in 2022. Alper states they have high ambitions: "We will focus on the casual puzzle genre for at least three years, but after that, we might consider tackling different genres. Our goal is to become a global leader in every genre we penetrate."

Aydın Karlibel RC 76

Says Goodbye to iDOB With Concert

Composer and pianist Aydın Karlibel spent 35 years of his remarkable artistic life at the Istanbul State Opera and Ballet (iDOB). iDOB's 35th Anniversary Concert, organized on the occasion of Karlibel's retirement, took place on September 27, 2022 at Kadıköy Süreyya Opera Stage.

One of the last students of Cemal Reşit Rey, Karlibel worked as a correpetitor, choir and orchestra conductor and concert pianist at iDOB. He composed opera, symphony, oratorio, piano and violin concertos, chamber music works and marches, bringing together universal elements and the original colors of Turkish aesthetics.

Karlibel credits RC with providing profound musical experiences that

influenced his career: "I was a regular performer at RC's musical events besides performing with the Istanbul Symphony orchestra under Cemal Reşit Rey's baton and trying my hand at concerto and song composition. I received the kindest support from our

Headmaster the late John Chalfant, who had me play our National Anthem at assemblies and gifted me musical scores. I am deeply grateful to our music teacher Miss Jean Strommer for her support of our RC band, and the late Grady Hobson's generous private teachings. Each and every one of our teachers provided the seeds whereupon I could compose works like the *Yahya Kemal Oratorio*, *The Ayubites*, *Lady with the Lamp* and *Piri Reis* operas. Mr. Chalfant's numerous contacts with Cemal Reşit Rey culminated in Rey's memorable speech given on our Graduation Day."

Karlibel has been invited by Mimar Sinan Conservatory to teach and will continue to contribute to Turkey's musical progress.

Dr. Alpdoğan Kantarcı RC 86 Working on Game Changer Cancer Treatment

A group of researchers at the Forsyth Institute lead by Dr. Alpdoğan Kantarcı have discovered a way to stop cancer growth, making the disease easier to treat and the treatment healthier for the patient. In the study, published in the *American Journal of Pathology*, Kantarcı and his team were able to show that an Omega-3 fatty acid derivative called Resolvin E1 reduces inflammation and kills the center of the tumor, stopping the spread of the disease and making the tumor easier to remove.

Kantarcı, who is a dentist, says the mouth has one of the most complex forms of inflammation, and that inflammation pathways are the same throughout the body. Inflammation is necessary for health, he states, but also plays a key role in cancer.

"Most cancer forms spread as a result of prolonged exposure to inflammation. Resolvins can redirect inflammation, so that something that has been chronic becomes an acute inflammatory pathway, and disease is more easily handled by your body

with no side effects. These compounds actually reprogram the inflammation." The study focused on an aggressive form of lung cancer. The group is now looking at other forms of cancer such as oral cancer and colon carcinoma. Kantarcı also studies the link between oral health and Alzheimer's disease.

Alpdoğan Kantarcı credits his parents and RC for arriving at this point in his career: "Robert College is about innovation, following your dreams, and free and critical thinking. I still use my chemistry teacher Mr. Mallinder's formulas. Mr. Eşref Sakarya, my biology teacher in Orta I, taught us to follow our curiosity. We never had traditional history classes with Hafize Hoca. It's impossible for me to repay my debt for all the years I was at Robert College."

Selim Suner RC 82 Develops Highly Practical Medical App

Selim Suner is a professor of Emergency Medicine, Surgery and Engineering at Brown University and an international expert in emergency preparedness and disaster medicine. After RC, Suner studied engineering at Brown. He graduated from Brown Medical School, after completing a master's degree in bio-medical engineering.

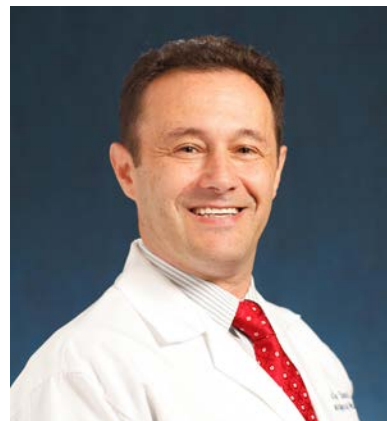
Suner combined his engineering mindset and medical expertise to develop an app – eMoglobin - that identifies a patient's hemoglobin levels through the photos of that patient's eyes, useful in emergency situations and countries that lack the necessary equipment.

Suner states that the idea came to him when he was working in emergency

rooms, where blood samples usually need to be drawn: "In some countries it is difficult to analyze blood samples. They lack the necessary equipment and facilities. This app will also help in emergency situations. Let's say there has been an accident, and the patient is in the ambulance. Results will be obtained immediately." The app will be submitted to the FDA for approval for widespread use.

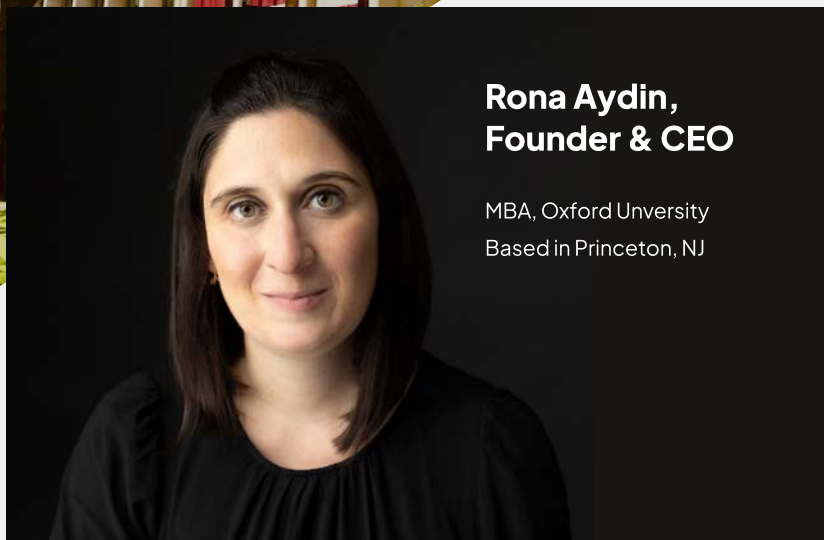
Suner is also involved in projects related to remote vital sign monitoring; touch-less temperature monitoring and developing platforms for drones for remote monitoring during disasters.

Suner sees RC as having a great influence in his career: "The seeds for the love of science were planted at RC. I owe a debt of gratitude to the teachers

who encouraged me and assisted in my acceptance to Brown University. Involvement in athletics at RC taught me the importance of teamwork and gave me the building blocks to create and be a part of a team."



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Theater at RC: A Sumptuous Feast for the Imagination

Theater constitutes one of the most enriching aspects of a Robert College education. Over the decades, RC productions turned many an ACG and RC student into an avid follower of the dramatic arts for life, as well as launching professional actors, directors, playwrights, and dramaturges. The theater tradition at RC and the RC theater community are still going strong in many interesting directions.

The RC archives show theater activities as early as the very beginning years of ACG and the early 1900s at RC. The defining impetus in those early years happened when the Hisar Players were formed in 1919. As related in the book *Tepedeki Okul* by Cem Akaş, the Hisar Players were a serious-minded bunch, comprised of students

and teachers. They were even asked to perform at Darülbeydi, the state conservatory of the time. In 1924, the Robert College Players was launched, and they started the tradition of a class play every year. In the 150th exhibition catalog, *Anatomy of a Tradition*, *Spreading the News*, a play about rural Ireland by Lady Gregory, as well

as various comedies are cited as the plays performed in the Players' first year. During the 1920s, not only were many plays staged, but also a detailed critique of each play was always penned. Mostly non-Muslim students and teachers were the actors, and female parts were played by the male students. Theater was taken seriously from the very start, and the respect for the discipline established it as one of the pillars of the RC experience through the decades.

In the 1930s plays in German and French, as well as English, are known to have been performed, and student-written plays were also staged during this time. The very first Turkish play at RC was also performed in the 1930s by the Turkish Society: *Fermanlı Deli Hazretleri* by Musahipzade Celal. Legend of Turkish theater Muhsin Ertuğrul himself expressed his gratitude to RC, whose productions he viewed as a service to Turkey. He was particularly impressed by a 1931 production of Shakespeare's *Merchant of Venice*. On the ACG front, an official Dramatic Association was formed in this decade, although

ACG records show there was some difficulty in getting plays approved. Charles McNeal was a pivotally involved member of faculty at the time, and both he and Hilary Sumner-Boyd, who would join RC in 1943, put a lasting stamp on the RC theater tradition with their contributions over the years.

Indeed it is the 1940s, when the theater scene at RC fully bloomed. Starting

with this decade, there were myriad productions in both English and Turkish in both RC and ACG. The two schools happily cooperated in casting. Faculty Ekrem Yirmibeşin, Şefik Yalçın, and Vildan Tarhan came on board for the productions in Turkish. Some of the students performing in the 1940s, such as Haldun Dormen RC 49, Şirin Devrim ACG 46, Tunç Yalman RC 44, Refik Erduran RC 47, became pioneers

and stars in theater; others, like former prime minister Bülent Ecevit RC 44 or former mayor of İstanbul Ahmet İsvan RC 44 became political figures. Writer Cevat Çapan RC 53 also frequented the stage in the 1940s.

The vibrancy of the theater scene at RC and ACG continued in the 1950s. By this time, along with monthly class plays, four major English and four

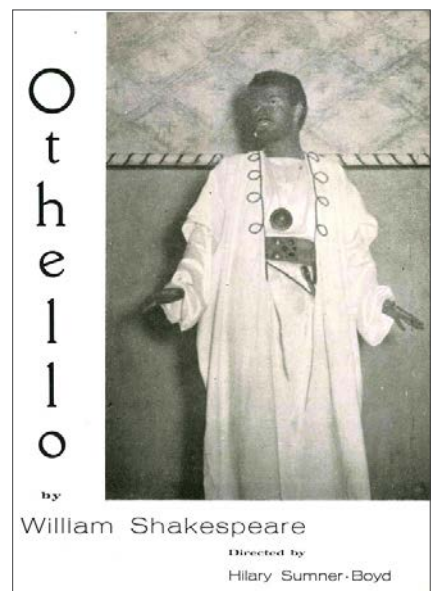

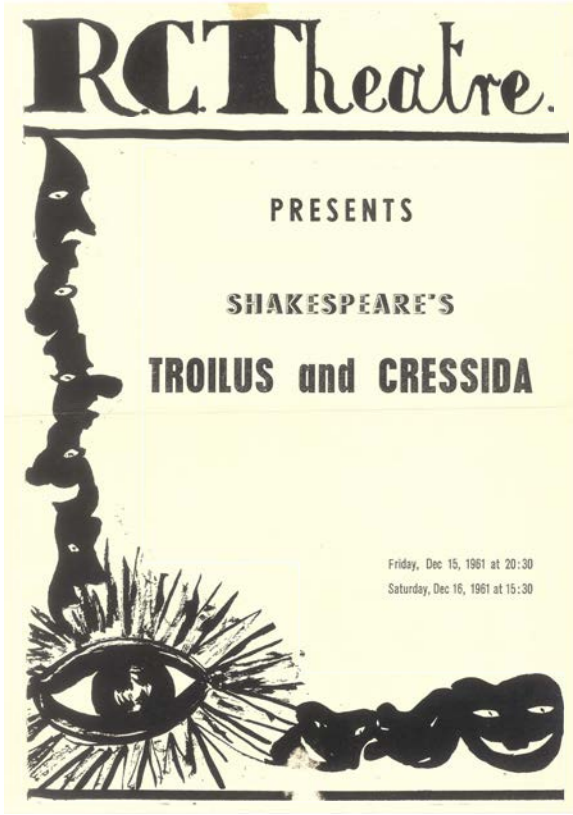
major Turkish plays were performed every year. This decade welcomed future heavyweights, such as Göksel Kortay ACG 55, Engin Cezzar RC 55, Özdemir Nutku RC 50, Ülkü Tamer RC 58, Genco Erkal RC 57. Oya Kaynar Başak ACG 55, who went on to become a professor of English at Boğaziçi University, also took to the stage in the 1950s. It is a testament to the dynamic cultural

and educational environment at RC that so many of its students explored the arts and acquired some of the skills and curiosity that empowered them to trailblaze in the arts, during their time at RC. Indeed in the RC Alumni Magazine dated 1983 Ayşe Kulin ACG 61 directed the question "Did your alma mater have any influence in your choice of career?" to Engin Cezzar RC 55. He answered "Our

teacher and advisor Hilary Sumner-Boyd has a great influence on my generation in choosing theater. My last school play was *Othello*. I was the lead. By the final curtain I had made my choice. After watching the play, Mina Urgan convinced my father who until then had opposed my desire to be an actor that I could be successful. I was sent to Yale to study theater arts. The College definitely influenced me in my choice."

The 1960s at RC also brought forth stars: Çiğdem Selişik Onat ACG 60, who played in Cocteau's *The Human Voice*, among other plays, went on to become a renowned actress. The first role ever for Nevra Şirvan Serezli ACG 65 was Christine in Strindberg's *Miss Julie*. Beloved writer Pınar Kür RC YÜK 63, was Cressida in Shakespeare's *Troilus and Cressida*. Ali Taygun RA 61, Ahmet Levendoğlu RA 64, Yavuzer Çetinkaya RA 65, Meral Taygun ACG 65 and Beklan Algan RC 53 all went on to become fixtures of the Turkish acting scene.

The 1970s were a turbulent time in Turkey politically. The switch to the general university exam and student adjustment to this new system, as well as the general political climate, including curfews, put somewhat of a damper on theater activities. The joining of RA and ACG created new energy, although it meant that the assembly hall used for theater productions at ACG had to be re-purposed as a gymnasium, leaving

most productions no choice but to perform on a makeshift stage for the next two decades. One of the highlights of this decade is the production of the first musical written by a student in 1978: Ali Özen's *The Wheel*.

In the 1980s, the Orta musicals helped fire up the dramatic scene once again. *The King and I*, *Evita*, *West Side Story*, and *Cabaret* were among these

ambitious productions. Işık Lisesi theater stage was hired for some of the musicals; the rest were performed at the gym. The *Cabaret* production was attended by Engin Cezzar RC 55 and Gülriz Sururi, who were themselves performing it at the time. Didem Sezer Manecolo RC 90 recalls this period with affection: "Watching *South Pacific* and *West Side Story* mesmerized me as an Orta student, so when I became a Lise

student, I auditioned and made it! I was part of the chorus girls in *Cabaret*, one of the three lead girls in *Sweet Charity* and one of the lead roles in *Delusions*, a play written by my classmate Kerem Deren. Staying late for rehearsals, working on the choreographies, trying on the costumes, doing our makeup are memories that will stay with me forever... In *Sweet Charity*, the song "Rhythm of Life" was really difficult to perform. We failed and failed until we got it right in the final rehearsal, and I still remember that moment of bliss when we were all screaming "we did it!" with tears in our eyes. I am very proud to have worked with Yeşim Özsoy and Kerem Deren, my classmates who have actually chosen this path as careers. Now that I work at a high school as a college counselor, whenever I watch the students performing musicals on stage, a part of me is with them, soaking in the spotlight and singing along."

The Orta school was also quite active with Turkish plays during the 1980s: Cevat Fehmi Başkut's *Ölen Hangisi*, Cahit Atay's *Karaların Memetleri*, Haldun Taner's *Keşanlı Ali Destanı*, were all staged by Orta students with the support of Turkish teachers such as Bilgi Haner at this time. Renowned actor Nedim Saban RC 86 turned in a stellar performance at Turgut Özakman's *Fehim Paşa Konağı*. Most of these plays were performed at Bingham 1. Oğuz Karakaş RC 88 recalls what playing at Bingham Hall entailed: "In *Karaların Memetleri*, Cahit Atay illustrates the suppression of local cultural traditions and the duality they impose on the people in the stories of three characters named Mehmet. Because there were no changing rooms at Bingham Hall, I had to change into my traditional costume in the P.E rooms at Gould Hall and walk

across center court in full costume.” RC continued to generate influential figures for the Turkish drama world, such as Yeşim Özsoy RC 90, Nedim Saban RC 86 and Haluk Özenç RC 88 during this decade.

A key development was inarguably the inauguration of the Suna Kırış Hall, named after RC Trustee Suna Kırış ACG 60. With its 500-seat capacity,

expansive stage and state-of-the-art sound and lighting rig, it brought the theater experience at RC to a whole other level. RC students and faculty thrived on these resources, as productions became both varied and more ambitious over time. Some of these included *Deli İbrahim* in 2001, *7 Kocalı Hümmüz* and *Celebration of Broadway* in 2004, *Of Mice and Men* and *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*

in 2008, *Aida* in 2009, and *Romeo and Juliet* in 2010, and, unforgettably, *Gizlenmiş Gölgeler Senfonisi* in 1998, written by Kadir Şan Tarhan, RC’s beloved switchboard operator from 1985 to 2017, in which members of the whole RC community performed.

The spirit of RC theater did not take a hit even during the pandemic. Members of the RC Theatre Company turned their screens into their stage and wrote an original TV series with original music by the students that included a news parody, a game show parody, a Socrates trial and a whodunnit podcast.

Another testament to the impact that Robert College has had on theater in Turkey is the Turkish Theater Festival – TIFES. Started in 2003 by RC 07 graduates Özge Onur, Nilüfer Çetinkaya and Lale Alpar, TIFES was organized by students and brought together participants from different schools with a goal of making students develop a sensitive approach toward the captivating world of theater.

RC Theater in the 21st Century

The traditions, environment and allure created in the first century of RC's theatrical history proved to be the wings that let RC theater continue to soar in the 21st century. Currently, RC boast three key associations: RC Theater Company with director Jake Becker, Turkish Theater ran by Hande Akat, and RC Musical Theater Company: Hamlin Players, directed by Caitlin Dunne. A modern drama elective is also offered, and a Turkish drama elective is in the works. These outlets give students and faculty ample opportunity to flex their dramatic muscles and provide the RC community with the opportunity to re-connect to a beloved experience, as they come to RC productions as an audience. RCQ interviewed faculty involved in theater in the past and present for the key highlights of this experience, that is ingrained into the RC community's lives, as professionals, academics, and enthusiastic, appreciative audience members.

RC Theater Director Jake Becker Explains How Theater Endows Students With New Skills

"Re-kindling the love of play is essential."

Jake Becker has been Theater Director at RC since 2015. He teaches creative arts for Lise Prep as well as the modern drama elective.

What skills do you aim to instill in students?

Especially since Covid, a comfort in expressing themselves with their bodies and a return to valuing their imagination as a tool for thought and play; in short, a re-kindling of the love of play. Other than these, composition on stage, scene preparation, comfort in taking risks and stepping outside of themselves, moving their bodies

in ways they find funny, playing with their voices, finding something exciting about any scene and playing with it.

In the modern drama elective in particular, students who were never in theater have a chance to experiment and become comfortable and confident on stage. Veteran actors get a chance to more consciously reflect on what they are doing and try new styles. All get access to contemporary texts and a variety of approaches to acting and the theater.

Overall, a chance to move and behave differently during the day shocks their systems and pushes their brains to work differently. Especially for the Preps, I see them take a break from the stress of the prior year of exams. In our first classes you can see shy smiles and giggling as they get into the work.

What is the process like of putting a play together?

In RC Theater, students generally want challenging content and concepts. Every play is different and can offer different approaches, and that is where the creativity comes in, no matter if it's *The Bacchae* or *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*. We read together as a company, discuss the spine of the play, what motivates the characters' actions, and difficult and exciting moments to play. We look at what we want the audience to take from the play. We let students make a lot of the choices on their own and the vision and feel of the play can change as we're working on it. We use music during rehearsals to inspire and inform. In fact, we've featured original music written by students. In *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* Bora Arsan RC 22 and Kaan Güçyetmez RC 21 composed the songs. In *The Bacchae* this March, a student - Sinan Tokemci L12 - is contributing two soundscapes.

What are the most memorable plays you've directed?

All of them in their own way have unforgettable moments. *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* was flipped and RC 18 grad Rosa Mizrak's Chief Bromden killing McMurphy was as powerful a scene as I've ever seen. RC 15 alumni Selin Özülkölü and Ali

Sarılgan in *The Glass Menagerie*, Azra Haseki RC 20 in *Women and Wallace*, Evren Çiçekli RC 22 as a traumatized boy in *Game*, Ali Çataltepe RC 18 in *Renewal*, Selis Yaltkaya RC 20 in *Bald Soprano*, Deniz Vural RC 15 in *Almost, Maine* and so many more. Each night characters develop as the students feel emboldened to make precise choices in their characterizations.

Performing on stage after the Covid absence and finishing the night with a song we wrote was a sweet way to acknowledge the road all of us took to get to that point again. It really built community. We also really enjoyed our Zoom TV shows.

Hande Akat, Director of Turkish Theater, Finds That Challenges Cause Students to Thrive

"As with all forms of art, theater transforms a person."

Hande Akat ran the Turkish Theater Club between 2014-2017. After moving to Germany for a bit, she returned to

RC and is the Director of the Club once again. Akat, with her colleagues, has restructured the Turkish drama elective, which will be available next year. She also plans after-school workshops with Görkem Örskiran RC 13.

What are the skills theater instills in the students?

Theater helps students understand themselves and the world. As with all forms of art, it transforms a person. When preparing for a role, improvising, doing vocal or movement exercises,

one focuses on oneself and her relationship to her environment. She hears herself, feels, empathizes, observes, lives the moment and reflects it on a behavior. One creates a new character that has remnants of one's own personality. This is the power and effect of theater: One knows oneself through this journey.

Our students in the club take responsibility, develop their leadership skills within the group dynamic. They analyze the characters and the cultural context in which the characters exist. They learn to balance their theater work with their academic work.

Any memories that stand out?

The last play I directed with Özlem Kanar was *Katil Kim? (Clue)*. We worked on it for two months but had to give it up due to changes in the cast. The students kept their motivation and searched for another play, despite the hardships of the pandemic. They even translated the play we chose into Turkish. The search for Turkish idioms or the right cultural references were a lot of fun.

Hamlin Players Director Caitlin Dunne Invites Preps into the Fold of Musical Theater

"We are perfectly imperfect."

English teacher Caitlin Dunne is the director of the Hamlin Players which she launched in 2016. They are going strong with musical theater productions, some of them in the tradition of dinner theater.

How has the Hamlin Players evolved since it started in 2016?

When the Hamlin Players first started, I focused on Preps to give them a chance to be center stage. But over the years they continued, so now the club is made up of students from all levels, with a third of them being Preps. It is important that Preps get the chance to perform in English and explore the art of musical theater.

At first we did variety shows, but these past few years we've been putting on full productions of musicals. Last year we staged *Shrek Jr.* which, with the pandemic protocols still in place, we performed in the Maze rather than our

usual dinner theater set-up in Bingham 1. This year we performed in Suna Kırac during December. I love the quirkiness of our dinner theater tradition where we have the students interact with the audience in character and serve the various courses of the dinner menu. We can't do dinner theater in Suna Kırac, but we allowed for in-character interactions with the audience.

What do you hope the participating students get out of the performances?

A sense of fun. I love watching students take ownership and develop their skills. We are not a conservatory, we most

definitely won't be perfect; in fact, I tell my students that we are "perfectly-imperfect," but we have a blast on stage. So much of the traditional school system is set up so that students develop great ways of being successful as individuals, but they lack skills that would have developed through working together with others. Being a part of the Hamlin Players gives them these skills which benefit them as they move beyond RC to university and the working world.

Any anecdotes you'd like to share?

I have to give a shout-out to my student-leadership team who, for our performances in December, took charge and taught the choreography, designed costumes, and created props and a cool animated digital backdrop for a pivotal scene. This is the manifestation of everything I have ever hoped for Hamlin Players: a show that, while I am technically the director, is a student-centered and student-facilitated group that comes together from all corners of the school community to co-create a performance and share their joy in the form of musical theater.

Turkish Literature Teacher Mehmet Uysal Reminisces on Legendary Productions

"Theater is a relay, and I am lucky to have carried the baton for a period."

Mehmet Uysal, the head of the Turkish Language and Literature Department, ran the Turkish Theater Club between 1986-2002. Turkish Theater Club has always been one of the most active clubs in RC, and Uysal has many fond memories.

What do you see as the role of Turkish Theater Club at RC?

Turkish Theater Club is an important instrument for our students to delve deeper into Turkish literature and in particular Turkish theater literature. Through comedies and historical plays in particular, our students immersed themselves in the theater of the Republic. Of course, theater has also contributed immensely to students' social and emotional development, sometimes instigating our students to become professionals in this field.

What memories continue to shine through the years?

I started working with the Turkish Theater Club in 1986. The students offered me to do it, and I immediately accepted because of my love for theater and the fact that I was a Turkish literature teacher. Our first play was *Ah Şu Gençler* by Turgut Özakman- a social critique that centered on youth. Our cast included RC 86 students, such as Cem Akaş, Erdoğan Abacı, Umur Hatipoğlu, Selin Kibar, Bülent Özgönenel. From 1986 to 2002, we put on stage one or two plays every year, comprising over 20 plays.

One of the plays I cannot forget is *Bir Kilo Namus* by Refik Erduran RC 47. We played it at the gym, now our library. For theater they say, "iki kalas bir heves" (two planks and motivation). Our stage design was exactly that. We created a platform made of wooden cubes. Our carpenter Şaban Bey put two planks on it, and that was the stage. Our internal services director İbrahim Bey gave us two rugs, which we used to cover the cubes. On

opening night, the playwright and our alumnus Refik Erduran took his place in front. Cevdet Şamikoğlu RC 89 and Mirey Ovadiya RC 88 were in the play. In one scene, Cevdet was chasing Mirey. Before I could say "be careful," Cevdet stepped between the wooden cubes and dismantled the whole stage, toppling it down. We continued under a thunder of applause. We also put on a play written by Hikmet Hükümenoğlu RC 89, who is now an award-winning Turkish author.

After the Suna Kırac Hall opened, we had access to extraordinary facilities. One of the unforgettable plays we put on stage there was Haldun Taner's *Ayışığında Şamata*. The director, Haluk Özenç RC 88, is a professional of theater, cinema and TV now. Other plays at Suna Kırac Hall included *Resimli Osmanlı Tarihi* by Turgut Özakman, *Nora Bir Bebek Evi* by Henrik Ibsen, *Bahar Noktası* by Shakespeare (the Can Yücel translation), and *Düdüklüde Kıymalı Bamy* by Memet Baydur.

The real success and achievement belong to my students. I learned with them and was happy. We contributed to the school spirit. It is a relay, and I am lucky to have carried the baton for a period.

Charlotte Şamlı Recalls Striking Moments in RC Productions, From Shakespeare to the Student-Written Musical Harem

Charlotte Şamlı was a drama teacher at RC from 1992-2012 as a member of the Creative Arts team, but when she became the Theater Director in 2007, she created a group of students of mixed ages and gender who would participate in a range of productions throughout the year; not just aim to be the "star" of one show but part of a supportive group taking on a variety of roles throughout the year.

Which play or plays that you worked on stand out most in your mind? Any stories that you'd like to share?

Some of the productions which stand out in my mind are *Amadeus* which included multiple performers of both genders playing the part of Mozart and enabling us to showcase some of our students who could sing opera beautifully. *Frankenstein* in which we were able to link stem cell developments in science with some of the ideas behind the play and in which the lead role was played by someone who was struggling with English but was brilliant in his performance, all combined with an exciting recycled

set design which I loved. Shakespeare performed all over the school grounds in which the audience moved from scene to scene was also one of my favorites, culminating in *Romeo and Juliet* on the front entrance to the school. The student written musical *Harem* in which we collaborated with the music department was both demanding and rewarding and has to go down as one of my favorites. Last and not least *Death and the Maiden*, a hard-hitting modern play about corruption and abuse, was superb and left me feeling that I had achieved all that I wanted with RC Theater Company.

When I first joined RC, Drama Club consisted entirely of girls. I was able to get the balance back and had a healthy number of both boys and girls who wished to participate! All in all it was a most rewarding experience, and I was happy to leave all we had built in the safe hands of Jake Becker with whom I had worked on many projects and loved his fresh take on theater.

Dorothy İz: A Theatrical Legacy for the Ages

RC English teacher Dorothy İz, was a critical figure for RC theater, following the tough acts of Hilary Sumner-Boyd and Charles MacNeal with panache. Having graduated from Oxford University with a degree in English Literature in 1951, she joined ACG in 1956. She was instrumental in increasing the number of plays put on stage, as soon as she joined the school. Indeed one of the plays she wrote generated great revenue in ticket sales and helped fund more plays in the years to come.

When the two schools merged in 1972, the auditorium where the plays had been staged was re-purposed, leaving the drama community at school in a difficult spot. Mrs. İz, as she was known to her beloved students, was undeterred and continued to put on plays at the newly-minted gym. *Pass the Butler* by Eric Idle and *Art and Eros* by Iris Murdoch were among the plays performed at this period.

When Suna Kiraç Hall opened its curtains in 1989 how thrilled she must have been, when she saw RC finally acquire a new level of production capability. Mrs. İz took to the stage at Suna Kiraç Hall with many renowned RC graduates, before she retired in 1991. Although Mrs. İz left a lasting legacy in the RC theater tradition, she was also a beloved English teacher, always engaging, innovative, and interactive, teaching the challenging World Literature elective, as well as English, in the final years of her illustrious teaching career.

Here Emre Azizlerli RC 88, senior producer at BBC Worldwide, illustrates the far-reaching impact of Mrs. İz: "Mrs. İz was an ambitious woman. She picked

some incredibly tough texts for us, then just teenagers, to perform on stage. But enthusiasm is contagious. She believed in our commitment and intellectual curiosity to think big and take risks. We were inspired by her energy and encouragement. When she handed us *Art and Eros* for a first reading, a philosophical conversation between some real, some fictitious characters from Ancient Greece, exploring the idea of why we need art and what purpose it serves, I remember feeling both elated, and lost. It was dense. This was my first introduction to the writing of Iris Murdoch, English novelist and philosopher, and an old friend of Mrs İz from her Oxford University days. Perhaps because I had a deeper voice than other cast members, I was assigned the role of Socrates, who argued with five other characters, including Plato,

on the significance of beauty. *Art and Eros* was not meant to be a play - hence it had no stage directions. For days on end we discussed the text, the philosophy behind it, and transformed the dialogues into a theatrical spectacle. Mrs İz later sent a video recording of the play to Mrs. Murdoch, who was pleasantly surprised to see a dramatized version of her text, only intended as dialogues to be read on the page. I still keep a copy of the letter the author wrote back to our drama club, thanking each and every one of us. Looking back at the stage photographs of the play, I see a young boy in a toga, his hair brushed with talcum powder to give an aged look, trying to bring back to life a long dead philosopher. Since then, my hair now naturally looks the part. And I still think it is worth to ponder - does beauty lead us to truth?"

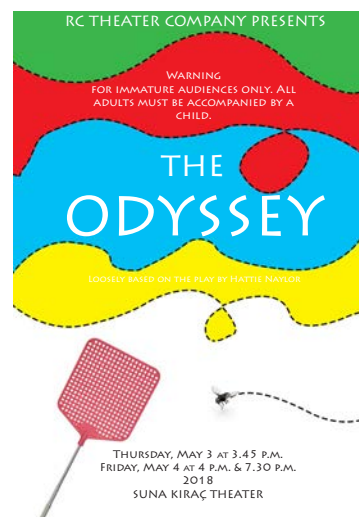

All the World is a Stage for RC Alumni:

RC alumni have trailblazed for decades in Turkish theater. They take us both to critical moments in Turkish theater history, as well as unforgettable performances on RC stages.

Haldun Dormen RC 49: The Gentleman of Turkish Theater



Haldun Dormen is an actor, writer and director who has significantly contributed to the modernization of Turkish theater with a prolific body of work; he continues to perform, lead and inspire to this day.

Dormen transferred to RC from Galatasaray Lisesi in Orta, already bitten by the theater bug. He remembers that all he wanted was to be involved in theater. Therefore, he applied to the Theater Club, as soon as he arrived at RC. The president of the club at the time was Refik Erduran RC 47, who went on to become one of the foremost playwrights of Turkish theater. It was Erduran who convinced the members of the club to let the newcomer in, so that “he would see how difficult theater was and learn his lesson.”

Soon enough Dormen was on stage with roles such as Olivia in Shakespeare’s *Twelfth Night*. Dormen’s memory of another production, *Campus Follies*, gives an indication of what was ahead for him as a director: “The boys wore sheets and pretended to be women for the female parts. At that time, we were supervised by Prof. Dean Allen. When angered, he would shout ‘Go home,’ and freely hand out penalties. It occurred to me that it would be interesting to involve him in the play, so I offered him a part. He accepted on the spot. At one point in the play, as we were dressed up in sheets singing, Prof. Allen would dart onto the stage and shout ‘Go home’ to dismiss us. We loved the joke, and it made us laugh for some time to come.”

Haldun Dormen went on to Yale University to study drama. Tunç Yalman RC 44 was already there and directed Dormen in *The Myrmidons*. Dormen was the first Turkish actor to perform in Turkey after studying abroad.

Shortly after his return to Turkey, he started the Cep Theatre which lasted for several years. In 1957 he founded the Dormen Theatre where he put on such successful plays as *Papaz Kaçtı* (*See How They Run*), *Şahane Züğürtler* (*Tovaritch*) and *Sokak Kızı Irma* (*Irma la Douce*), which was the first western musical production in Turkey.



Haldun Dormen worked in TV and radio broadcasting and as a journalist for Milliyet newspaper. He also taught at the Theater Department of Istanbul University State Conservatory for many years. He was instrumental in establishing the Afife Jale Theater Awards in 1977, and it still constitutes one of the most prestigious awards in Turkish theater. He revived one of the Turkish theater classics, the *Lüküs Hayat* (*Luxury Life*) operetta in 1984, which went on to become a huge success and was on stage for over 25 years.

In several schools, Haldun Dormen has taught nearly 1000 young people who became important people in the Turkish theatre.

Göksel Kortay ACG 55: Multi-Faceted Contributions to Turkish Theater

Göksel Kortay is one of the beloved greats of Turkish theater. Although her father wanted her to attend a French school, Kortay refused. Due to this disagreement, she almost missed the ACG entrance exam. Luckily, she passed the exam with flying colors and was given the chance to take another exam to complete the two-year Introductory Class in one year, and, thus, began her love for RC.

Kortay's first role on the RC stage was as Mazlume in Reşat Nuri Gültekin's play, *Taş Parçası* (A Piece of Stone). Kortay underlines that her RC education was multi-dimensional, covering a wide range of subjects, from history to cultural studies. The

library was a critical resource, giving the students access to books that were not available elsewhere in Turkey at the time. While a junior at ACG, she met Haldun Dormen, who had by then returned from the US, and that meeting cinched her intentions for a life in the arts.

Following ACG, she took the Fulbright exam and got a scholarship to study theater, the only person to receive it in the field of art at the time. Kortay got her master's degree in theater and television from Boston University, completing the three-year program in three semesters. After having worked at semi-professional and professional theaters, and at NBC in production for 3.5 years, she returned to Turkey. Her first professional role was at Kenter Theater in Bertol Brecht's *The Threepenny Opera*. After that she performed in many prominent companies in Istanbul, as well as in numerous TV series and cinema films over the years. One of Kortay's most significant contributions to Turkish theater are the numerous plays she translated into Turkish, all of them staged. For many years, she worked as a program specialist at TRT, where she directed radio plays and produced programs. She is realizing her 59th consecutive year on stage this



year. She has acted in various roles in numerous plays until today, the latest one being Moliere's *Kıbarlık Budalası* (The Bourgeois Gentleman), which staged 670 performances over 12 consecutive years. She is a teacher, acting coach, actor, director, translator and dubbing artist.

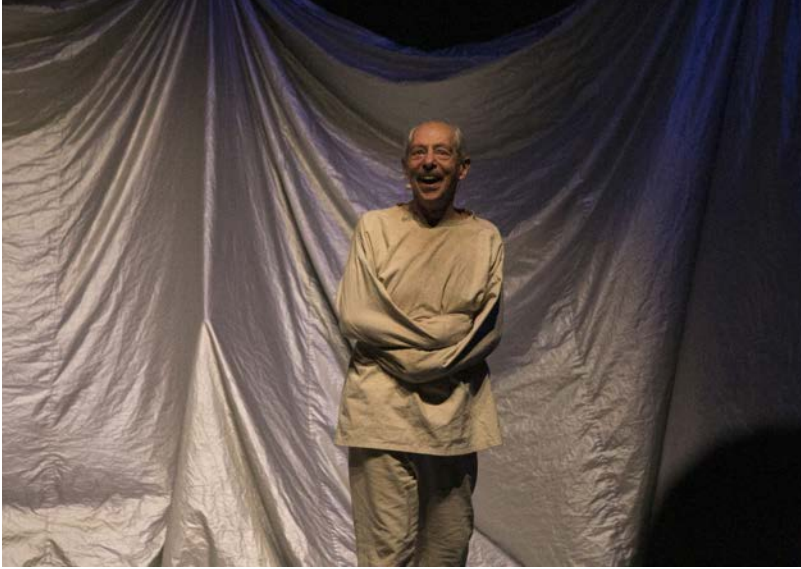
Kortay's activism is also noteworthy. She has advocated for actors' rights from the very beginning of her career. She was chosen as the President of the Turkish Actors Association for 15 years and was the head of the jury for the Afife Jale for five years. She also worked with many associations that create social impact. Another way which Kortay has given back is through her teaching: Most of the successful young actors seen on stage and screen have been her students, a fact that underlines Kortay's passion for this aspect of her career.

Kortay says that she has always been grateful for her education at ACG, as it gave her the self-confidence and strength to take her life in a direction that she did not even dare think of before. In an interview she gave to RC students in 2009, Kortay credited RC with giving her the vision and knowledge to proceed with her life and career. She has always done her best to represent RC well in every platform. She sees the friendships she made through ACG and RC as the greatest enrichment of her life.

Genco Erkal RC 57: An Unwavering Voice in Turkish Theater

Genco Erkal is one of the most important and vocal actors in Turkey. He made his debut on the RC stage in 1953 as Lorenzo in Shakespeare's *Merchant of Venice*. During the next four years, he had roles in eight productions, in English and Turkish, and was the president of

the Robert College Players. He directed two Moliere plays and took them on tour on the Aegean coast during the spring break of 1956-57 school year. He often shared the stage with Engin Cezzar RC 55 during his time at RC. Erkal came back to campus after his graduation to produce Jean Cocteau's monologue, *The Human Voice*, with Çiğdem Selişik in the lead, during the 1959-1960 season.

Erkal got his BA in psychology from Istanbul University after RC. His parents had not wanted him to study acting, so he studied his second choice, but the love for theater was already in him. Erkal recalls Hilary Sumner-Boyd and Charles MacNeal as the RC teachers who had the most influence on him and helped him channel his natural tendencies to theater.

Following stints at prestigious private theater companies, he founded Dostlar Theater, of which he is the artistic director to date. He directed plays by Gorki, Brecht and Havel, as well as

Vasıf Öngören, Haldun Taner, Nazım Hikmet and Refik Erduran RC 47. He has won numerous awards, including for his movie roles. He frequently collaborates with other artists, such as Fazıl Say and Zülfü Livaneli and is currently performing Nazım Hikmet's *Yaşamaya Dair (On Living)*. In fact, he has performed the poet Nazım Hikmet's work throughout his career and states he first came across the poet's work during his college years.

In the autobiographical film *Genco: Tiyatroya Adanmış Bir Yaşam (Genco: A Life Dedicated to Theater)*, Erkal states, "Every moment on stage was a joy for me and I enjoyed it as if I would never be able to do it again. My time on this earth passed with this joy and I hope it continues the same way because my journey continues." Erkal has often credited his time at RC as solidifying his passion for theater. Erkal's advice for budding artists and actors is to study all kinds of art and literature, to be involved in cultural events and also to become well-versed in subjects as diverse as politics, economy, and philosophy.

Çiğdem Selişik Onat ACG 60: Educator and Actor

One of the greatest actresses of her generation, Çiğdem Selişik Onat was on stage often during her time at ACG. In Shakespeare's *Othello*, she was Bianca, while Engin Cezzar RC 55 played the titular character. She also shared the stage with Genco Erkal often. She played Lydia Languish in *The Rivals* by Richard Brinsley Sheridan and the leading role Hedda Gabler Tesman in Ibsen's *Hedda Gabler*. During the 1959-1960 academic year, Selişik took over the drama activities of ACG. In the same year, she won high recognition with her role in Jean Cocteau's play *The Human Voice*, which Erkal came back to school to direct. Selişik's eloquent Turkish and English and her talent carried her forward.

Following ACG, Çiğdem Selişik Onat studied at Istanbul University's Literature Faculty. She founded Genç Oyuncular and also performed with

Kenterler Theater and Ankara State Theater. She obtained her master's in drama from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Not only did she act in and direct numerous plays in the US, but she also taught for

many years at Lincoln Center, North Carolina School of Arts, and the New York University Tisch School of Drama. She also taught at Koç University and continues to act in Turkish films and TV series.

Ahmet Levendoğlu RA 64: A Prolific Theater Veteran



Ahmet Levendoğlu was quite active in theater in his years at RC, working on

the board of the Drama Club as well. In fact, he experienced the phrase "the show must go on" firsthand at RC. He recalls that he was playing Willy Loman in *Death of a Salesman* by Arthur Miller, when word about JFK's assassination reached everyone right after Act 1. There was an impromptu crisis meeting, and the directing teacher told the students, including Levendoğlu, that the show must go on. Levendoğlu states that up until then, the expression was merely words, and the meaning hit him fully right then and there. He also states he was much too young for this role, but with the license of amateur theater and the audacity of youth, he went for it!

Ahmet Levendoğlu appeared frequently on stage while at Robert Academy, performing in plays such as Franz Kafka's *Duruşma (The Trial)* and as Sergeant Charles Baker in *Son Dakika (Time Limit!)*, written by Henry Denker and Ralph Berkey.

Levendoğlu graduated from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in England, after RC. Upon his return, he took to the stage at Ankara Devlet Tiyatrosu. He is a prolific theater professional as an actor, director, author, teacher, and translator. He founded Tiyatro Stüdyosu in the 1990s. He is regarded as having impeccable command of both Turkish and English that brings much esteem to his translations for theater.

Nevra Şirvan Serezli ACG 65: The Fair Lady of Turkish Theater

Nevra Serezli is an acclaimed actress in theater, cinema, and TV. When she was a prep at ACG, she was given a role in a play so that she could practice English. She was intrigued and acted in many plays through the years. Her debut on RC stage was as Christine in Strindberg's *Miss Julie*. However, it was *My Fair Lady* at RC that put her under a bright spotlight at a young age.

Serezli appeared in seven productions at RC. In an interview she gave to RC students, Serezli recalls that she spent every moment outside of class with legendary drama teacher Mrs. İz. Mrs. İz put on two or three plays every year at those times, and Serezli acted in all of them. She recalls that rehearsals would last well into the night, and that she and Mrs. İz were virtually inseparable. She states that students were so into theater that they would follow teachers around to convince them to put on certain plays. She also underlines that in order to be

allowed to be in plays, one's academics also had to be good, and Serezli was diligent about class work!

Following her graduation, Serezli worked in various theater groups and also founded her own with Metin Serezli, Altan and Füsün Erbulak in the 1970s. In the 1980s, she was unforgettable in the musical *Hisseli Harikalar Kumpanyası* (*The Wonderland Company With Shares*) written by Haldun Dormen RC 49, as well as through her performances in *Devekuşu Kabare Theater*. In the 1990s, her work in plays such as *Yolun Yarısı* (*Halfway Down the Road*) and *Çılgın Sonbahar* (*Mad Fall*) gained tremendous popularity and garnered awards. Her return to theater in 2020 with *Ağaçlar Ayakta Ölür* (*Trees Die Standing Tall*), directed by Nedim Saban RC 86, was met with enthusiasm by the audiences who had missed her presence on stage.

Serezli thinks her years at ACG were a true milestone in her life, shaping her confidence, personality, and ethics.

She recalls signing the honor code during Orta exams, a commitment that affected her deeply emotionally and constituted a guiding light throughout her life. She also remembers her role in *My Fair Lady* fondly and wishes that she had had a chance to play it professionally as well: "The way Eliza Doolittle progresses in that play is so fun to play. I love such changes in a character, and they always captivate the audience."

Kerem Kurdoğlu RC 81 Creates With Versatility

“Don’t ever stop doing theater’ may be the most important sentence of my life.”

Kerem Kurdoğlu pursues a dual career as a visual effects artist and playwright/director. He worked on many Netflix and Disney Plus productions recently, and his version of *Richard III* premiered at the IKSİV International Theater Festival in November 2022.

How did your experience in theater at RC influence your career?

RC is the main reason for all my important career choices in my life including university: I chose Boğaziçi University because I thought their drama club was the best. In my first year at RC, I managed to get a role: the son of a housewife, played by Perihan Mağden. We arranged for Ali Erdemci from the Bosphorus University Drama



Club to direct the play. After the play, someone came to me and said, “you’re so good, please don’t ever stop doing

theater.” It might be the most important sentence that formed my life.

Of all the performances at RC, which stand out the most?

In my senior year, I became the president of the Drama Club. Trying to decide which play to produce, a friend of mine said her neighbor was a playwright: Bilgesu Erenus. I went and asked for advice. She said young people should write their own plays about their own problems. I told my friends that I wanted to direct my own play, and they agreed. We told our decision to our advisor, Dorothy İz, and she accepted. Now, seeing many young playwrights trying to stage their plays, I see how lucky I was.

Nedim Saban RC 86 Appreciates the Intellectual Openness of RC

“RC formed my artistic background.”

Nedim Saban is an actor, director, producer, and founder of Tiyatrokare. He started out in children’s theater, and to this day is a prolific theater professional, with many accolades and awards.

What role do you think RC had in developing so many actors of your generation?

A theater career requires self confidence, also the quest of having something new and original to say. The intellectual openness, broad research possibilities and encouraging innovation are RC’s contributions to the potential artist. RC’s history shows that the theater flourishes in spite of the lack of a theater space. When the political, social oppressions are felt, the theater productivity is withdrawn. The competition and time restraints



are also factors. Theater becomes a social activity helping the individual instead of a push to the artist.

Did RC influence your career?

I was not a good student and didn’t feel a sense of belonging. I was involved in professional theater, and school seemed an obstacle. Now that I look back, I understand that RC was a very safe cultural environment in which I subconsciously participated; it formed my artistic background.

Any memories you’d like to share?

My first interview in a daily paper was at age 15. The photographer wanted to take advantage of the beautiful garden of the school. I fully enjoyed these moments and was late to class. The article was published during my weekend detention! I comforted myself, believing that the choice of a career as an artist will always require a price. Looking back, it surely did!

Haluk Özenç RC 88 Stayed With RC Theater Beyond Graduation

I “This is not an easy career, but I am smitten.”

Haluk Özenç is an artist of many talents, and predominantly a screenwriter. He will soon be seen in a new digital series as both screenwriter and actor. He is also starring in Ray Cooney's *2 in 1*.

How has RC influenced your career?

RC gave importance to art, as well as academics, perhaps the only school to do so. Bilgi Haner, Mehmet Uysal and Mrs. İz always pushed me towards the stage. I acted in both Turkish and English plays. I spent my time in plays more than in classes. In 1990, I came back to RC as advisor to the Theater Club. In 1994-1997 I was the Turkish Theater Director. I believe I have the record in terms of the number of plays I was involved in, before and after



graduation. This is not an easy career, but I am smitten.

Which performances stand out?

Ölen Hangisi (Who Died) in Turkish theater; we had a great cast. In English, *Sarcophagus*, a play about the Chernobyl disaster. After graduation, we staged Lorca's *Blood Wedding* as a musical and did the music with Kadir Şan Tarhan and Erdem Helvacıoğlu RC 94. Our production of *Lüküs Hayat* made waves and was attended by State Theater players. One of my own plays, *Şebek*, had a 40-minute video projection: We innovated a lot! Finally, the Suna Kırış Hall launch: I lent it technical support and helped turn it into the unforgettable night that it was.

Yeşim Özsoy RC 90 Fondly Remembers Not Having a Stage

I “Courage, freedom, and power were integral parts of RC as values.”

Yeşim Özsoy is the founder and artistic director of GalataPerform. She is also the President of the Theater Cooperative.

What about RC influenced your career?

Two things: the freedom and space for exploring and finding your own voice and the fact that we had to build a stage to perform each year because Suna Kırış Hall didn't exist at the time. I found the courage, the freedom and power to be able to do all that I do, and these values were an integral part of RC. Building a theater has always been my passion. For years we did Visibility Project in Galata where the streets, abandoned buildings and shops became our performance space.

Of all the performances you were involved in at RC, which ones stand out?

In our last year we performed Kerem Deren's *Delusions*, and I was the president of the musical club. During *Delusions* I was making sure that everything ran smoothly which became a habit for me later in my life. Kerem kept losing his scripts, as he was still writing when we were rehearsing, and I was trying to keep him on track. I remember that as a fun and a little bit painful experience. Later on Kerem became an important screenwriter, and he became a planner and a disciplined writer. And in my life I wrote many plays for stage, but I always kept it together because I was producing and/or directing the play too.

Leyla Levi RC 12 Views Theater as a Way of Saying the Personal is Political

I “Theater is a tool of world building.”

Leyla Levi is in the final year of her directing MFA at Yale School of Drama, with her thesis production scheduled to open in January 2023: a new play called *Marys Seacole* by Pulitzer prize winning playwright Jackie Sibbles Drury, about the global unequal distribution of care labor.

What have you been up to recently?

Last May, I closed a production of *Romeo and Juliet*. It has been an incredible gift to work with visionary artists and teachers like Liz Diamond, Yuri Kordonsky, Lileana Blain-Cruz, and most recently, the Russian director in exile, Dmitry Krymov.

How did your experience in theater at RC influence your decision to pursue your studies in drama?



My theater life started as an actor in Suna Kırac Hall and in Bingham, working with Charlotte Şamlı and Murat Ersan. I studied architecture in college, then ran an educational arts program for many years, but my first directorial experiments all happened at RC. I remember acting in Feride Eralp’s play in my freshman year, writing and directing things with my friends, meeting Sarah Kane’s work in Ms. Şamlı’s modern drama class, acting in my senior year in an incredible 3-hander called *Death and the Maiden* by Ariel Dorfman. That is when I internalized that the theater is a tool of worldbuilding, prefigurative imagination (a beautiful idea from Robin Kelley’s book *Freedom Dreams*) and liberation. Doing theater is my way of saying that the personal is political.

Mert Dilek RC 14 Runs the Gamut in Theater

I “RC enabled me to dip my toes into writing on theater.”

Mert Dilek’s work in theater includes playwriting, dramaturgy, translation, criticism, and scholarship. He is currently a PhD candidate at the University of Cambridge and is affiliated with the National Theatre in London. Dilek regularly reviews theater, as well as creating new work as a writer and translator and is developing new projects for stage and screen, both in Turkey and in the UK.

How did you get involved with theater?

I was a keen spectator of theater. I worked on dozens of productions as an undergraduate at Yale in a wide array of roles (except for acting!). Whereas my research and teaching engage primarily with canonical plays of a literary nature, my recent productions have led me to ponder the mechanics of comedies and musicals!

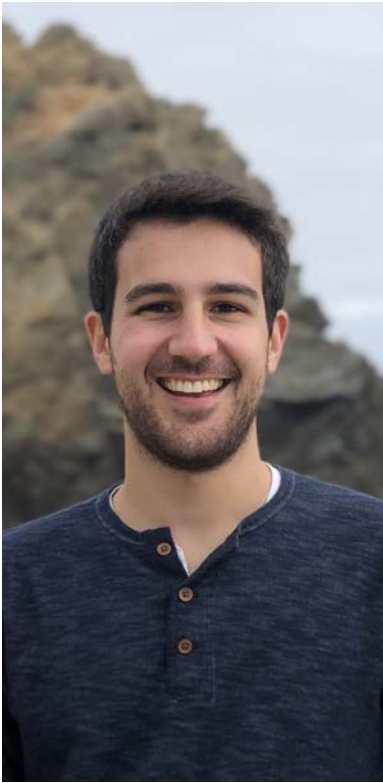


How did your experience at RC and in the Bosphorus Chronicle influence you?

I first felt motivated to pursue theater in concrete ways at RC. I watched every production that was put on during my time there. As a reporter and then editor-in-chief at Bosphorus Chronicle, RC enabled me to dip my toes into writing on theater. Especially Martin McDonagh’s *The Pillowman* and Ariel Dorfman’s *Death and the Maiden* made strong impressions on me.

Also my play, *Agon*, received a staged reading at the end of my senior year. I was elated that this experimental one-acter had not only won the Jane Page Competition but was shared with the RC community.

Berk Çoker RC 13 Creates Waves in Education Through TeachFX



As co-founder of the app TeachFX, Berk Çoker is helping to transform the edtech industry, and was recognized for his work by making the Forbes 30 under 30 list. TeachFX incorporates AI technology to help teachers learn and grow in their profession by promoting frequent reflections. The app allows teachers to record their lessons so that the learning dynamics in the class, such

as diversity of participation or open-ended questions, can be identified by the app.

Çoker likens TeachFX to an instructional coach sitting in class and providing feedback to the teacher privately: “Research shows that objective feedback and regular coaching help teachers improve, but are often out of reach. Our solution to this challenge is to provide teachers with frequent, job-embedded feedback using artificial intelligence, and give teachers a space for reflection, so they can lead their own learning. Teachers know their students the best and are the biggest leverage points in the system, and we could be leveraging teachers’ knowledge and expertise much more than we currently do.”

Çoker met his co-founder at a mixer he himself was organizing for the Social Innovation Club at Stanford. His co-founder had taught for two years at the high school level and had a lot of entrepreneurial ideas about the teacher development space: “The final version of the idea for TeachFX came about when we started working together. Next thing you know, we had joined an incubator and had raised our seed round funding.”

The results are amazing thus far: “This year, we’ve been working with over 100 schools and districts across the US and have a few state-wide partnerships.

Teachers who use TeachFX increase the amount of student talk in their classroom by about 40%. We recently also had a research group out of Stanford, Harvard and the University of Maryland do a large-scale randomized control trial on one of the insights that’s in our app. The findings show that not only did the teachers increase their use of pedagogical uptake of building on student contributions by 24%, but students rated the course higher, they turned in more assignments and had higher academic achievement. We were awarded a grant from Gates Foundation to promote more research on our work, and also had a new investment round, including investments from Reach Capital and Pearson.”

Çoker states working on TeachFX for the past five years has given him a different lens and a whole other level of appreciation for the hard work that all the teachers at Robert College put in: “I’d like to give a huge thank you to Ms. Şamlı, who took me under her wings when I joined the theater company my prep year, and allowed me to learn and grow throughout high school in ways that I only understand today, challenging me as an actor with wide range of roles in plays, and of course in her brilliant Modern Drama class. Who could have known that years later when I met Jamie, my co-founder, that we would connect over drama.”

Curator Duygu Demir RC L12 04 Takes a Multidisciplinary Approach to Latest Exhibit

Duygu Demir received her BA in Art History and Visual Arts from Columbia University. She decided to become a curator in her senior year: “When I listened to curator Massimiliano Gioni, who described the Berlin Biennial he had curated in detail, I knew that this was what I wanted to do.” Since then, Demir has worked on numerous exhibitions as a programmer for SALT, including retrospectives and a group show titled *I Decided not to Save the World*. She continues her career as an independent curator.

Gözde İlkin’s solo exhibition *Entrusted Ground* at artSümer in September–November 2022 illustrates Demir’s curatorial approach: “The gallerist Aslı Sümer encouraged me to work with the artist. Having seen some of Gözde’s recent experimentation with dancer Aslı Bülbül, I had the idea to

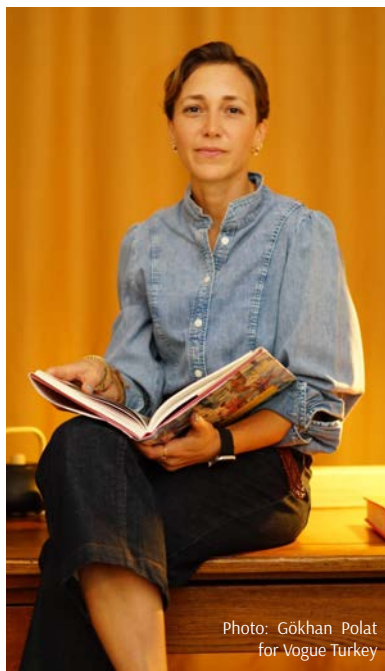

expand her usually two-dimensional fabric works into three dimensions. We conceived of the exhibition as a stage, with works to be activated through movement. The process became collaborative; we worked with a choreographer, dancer and a musician. The exhibition and the performance together revolve around the four elements of air, water, fire and earth. Activating all senses, *Entrusted Ground* in essence proposes a mental and physical perambulation through a landscape that theorist Donna Haraway describes as ‘natureculture.’”

Demir views her RC experience as having taught her not to approach life purely pragmatically, but to take pleasure in intellectual and artistic pursuits for the sake of them: “I came to value being a thinker more than a doer while at RC.”

Bahar Kural RC 90 Recognized Through Numerous Photography Awards

Bahar Kural received her first camera as a precious gift from her mother, when she was an 11-year-old prep student at RC. Since then, she has honed her craft and started entering prestigious international photography competitions. Up until now, she has received 106 awards from International Photography, Moscow International, Tokyo International, Budapest International, Prix de la Photographie Paris, Paris International Street Photography, Pollux, Julia Margaret Cameron, MasterPrize in Architecture, Neutral Density and One Eyeland Awards. Most recently, three of her images made it to the 2022 Tokyo International Official Selection, and she won 37 awards from the 19th Julia Margaret Cameron Awards.

Kural states that she has always been a keen observer of her surroundings: “My eye likes to frame and capture stories. I have a passion for history: where people come from and where they are going - which is why I like to document what I see through cityscapes, architectural and street photography. I like to focus on the details of a subject and play with color and light to produce abstract images.”

Kural credits RC’s liberal arts education with shaping her world view: “RC gave me the ability to think critically and made me a confident person - which is key in maneuvering life. Teachers like Phillip Esposito, who was never my teacher, but someone I came to know later in life and respect tremendously, make Robert College a very special institution.”



Pelin Bağcıvan Toğrul RC L12 03 Finds New Calling With Art

Pelin Toğrul left her corporate career behind to go back to school and study interior design. She also started taking art courses and got interested in wall painting: "I found out that I made some paintings unconsciously while making trials on plywood boards. That's when I decided to continue creating in that way." Her work was first shown in a group exhibition that took place in August 2022 at Ataşehir AVM, Cemal Süreya Etkinlik ve Sergi Salonu. She also exhibited in Bodrum and has her first solo exhibition, *Invitation to Art*, till June 2023 at Toro Karaköy Art Gallery.

Toğrul states that her main inspirations are nature and feelings: "The colors, shapes and patterns and all other elements of nature combined with feelings like happiness, sadness



and excitement are the subjects of my paintings. In fact, I'm inspired by anything natural." She adds: "Being in the Thessaloniki International Art Fair and an exhibition in Bulgaria, I tried

to represent Turkey with a different artistic style."

Toğrul's biggest takeaways from her RC years are the importance of self-education and the freedom of self-expression: "The education at RC gave me the skills to think flexibly and originally as well as generate ideas, and encouraged me to progress on my way after my corporate life. I discovered the art of wall painting which excited me after my interior design education, and I'll continue to move forward by developing myself more and learning new skills. The photography class at RC helped me connect more with nature and that in turn helped me set a different vision in my life." See her work on instagram @pt_art_design



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Şant Manukyan RC 93 Sheds Light on Global Markets



Global strategist at İş Yatırım Şant Manukyan distills decades of experience into his book *Global Piyasalar - Dünü Bugünü Yarını* (*Global Markets- Yesterday Today Tomorrow*, Kronik Kitap). The book is vast in scope, as Manukyan explains:

“The first two decades of the 21st century have been unprecedented, taking us through many of the major economic/financial concepts - such as deflation, inflation, secular stagnation, stagflation, recession, bankruptcy, default, boom, bust - and teaching us new ones. No economy or finance book I have mentions section 13-3 of the Federal Reserve Act. Most of us thought financial instruments such as CDS/CDO's were tools for hedging or for more efficient markets. Very few realized they were financial destruction tools.

“In my first book I have tried to provide a summary of the system, debunking hypes, showing how it really functions. I also discuss the future: Crypto assets (not currencies), central bank digital currencies, centralized and decentralized finance, and finally a new world order after the disintegration of the post-WW2 order, namely Bretton Woods. The final chapter is on how to prepare for the ‘Ordo ab Chao’ (order from chaos): Adjusting our cash flows, volatility and safe havens for investment.”

Manukyan credits RC with finding his credo: “RC has given me the foundations of individualism. ‘He travels the fastest who travels alone’ was Kipling’s line I read in the RC Library, and it motivated me to travel fast and far.”

Gül Özseven RC 86 Wins Award With New Poetry Book

On September 3, 2022, the second Altın Kalem Ödülleri (Golden Pen Awards) were given by the Book Culture Art Times newspaper, and Gül Özseven won an award with her new poetry book *Whispers* (Cinius Yayınları), in the category Best Poetry in English. Özseven started writing poetry at Robert College. Ever since her studies at Bryn Mawr College, she has been writing in English.

Whispers is Gül Özseven’s sixth poetry book in English and explores different aspects of love. Childhood fairytales like Snow White, Cinderella and Sleeping Beauty constitute the sources of Özseven’s inspiration: “We live in a very quick-moving age, where love relationships start and end like fast-food restaurant menus. You

devour them and move on, if there is the slightest problem, without patience, depth or endurance. The book’s cover features a frog, inspired by *The Frog Prince* because there are many love poems in this book,

but I don’t want the reader to think that every poem is a dedication to somebody else. We don’t need to kiss many different frogs before we find the correct man, Mr. Right for us, who turns into a prince.”

Suzan Nana Tarabulus ACG 71 Sr. Writes New Oral History Book

Following her previous oral history books *Bir Sabah Galata'da Uyandım* (One Morning I Woke up in Galata, Varlık Yayınları), *Çek Kayıkçı Balat'a* (Boatman Row to Balat, Varlık Yayınları) and *Baba Bize Neden Dönme Diyorlar?* (Daddy, Why Do They Call Us Dönme?, Varlık Yayınları), Suzan Nana Tarabulus continues her work with *Anlatmak İçin Yaşadım* (I Lived to Tell, Varlık Yayınları).

The book focuses on the period between the First and Second World Wars. "This narrative is a family adventure in the triangle of Bulgaria, Greece and Turkey," says Tarabulus. "We learn about the invasion of Greece, Kavala's tobacco, the fashion world of Beyoğlu, and the story of those who could and could



not escape from the Nazis, from the mouth of Mimika, who 'lived to tell.'" Suzan Nana Tarabulus was very impressed by Mimika's family history: "I was shocked and curious about the story of the father's escape and the Greek underground organization Andarte, which undertook it. These insurgents went down in history as revolutionaries and resisters during the war, communists and enemies after the war. During my visit to Ikaria in the north-eastern Aegean last summer, I observed that these insurgents formed a dilemma in the people's memory. The island housed both the Andartes and the fugitives. On the one hand, a monument was built in their memory, and on the other hand, the indecision about whether they are heroes or enemies still remains."

Lale Müldür RC 75 Continues Her Poetry Journey with *Kadınesk*



Lale Müldür's latest, *Kadınesk* (Yapı Kredi Yayınları) is a poetry collection accompanied by paintings by Ercan Arslan. The poems were written in Ercan Arslan's studio over many nights in the course of spring 2016.

Lale Müldür is one of the foremost Turkish poets, known for her deeply erudite and eccentric style. Her fascination with painting is not

recent. Her well-known poetry book *Yağmur Kızı Böyle Diyor* (Rain Girl Says So, Noktürn Kitapları) featured poetry written for French artist Collette Dreble's paintings. In her introduction to *Kadınesk*, Müldür states that she perceives poetry and painting as different media and that she felt like she was handing over music as she was writing these poems.

Aral Sürmeli RC 11 Puts Technology in Service of Displaced People

Aral Sürmeli met with RC students in September 2022 to share his journey from RC's Community Involvement Program (CIP) to medical school and the Harvard University T.H. Chan School of Public Health, to co-founding the Medical Rescue Association of Turkey (MEDAK), which supports medical rescue, disaster response, and healthcare of migratory populations. He is also the CEO and Founder of HERA, a mobile app that helps refugees access healthcare.

Sürmeli credits RC CIP for inspiring him to pursue a career in public health. In his talk he encouraged RC students to participate in CIP projects as early and often as possible during their time at RC to explore their interests and stretch out of their comfort zones. He advised students to “learn to make a real impact and measure it,” and emphasized the power of collaboration.

The RCQ followed up with Sürmeli on the many facets of his work:

How did you become involved with displaced people?

When people ask me where I got started, I always say it was the CIPs at RC. Everything I have been doing since then are different versions of CIPs. MEDAK is the first nonprofit I founded, and I still lead it. We are focused on providing medical assistance in humanitarian crises. Currently our mobile app HERA's program is led by MEDAK in Turkey. Being in service of others is what I love and I have been lucky enough to pursue it as a career.

With the Syrian crisis, seasonal migrant farm workers became a natural target population for my work. Displaced populations also carry vulnerabilities they had prior to displacement, so what we end up seeing is double or



even triple vulnerability. I am the son of an IDP (internally displaced person). My father had to flee his city, while he was in high school and came to Turkey due to concerns about his and his family's life. I feel a connection to displaced populations at a deep level.

What motivated you to create HERA?

MEDAK has been working with refugees, providing direct care in border cities and implementing health literacy trainings. In 2017, I did an internship at Harvard's Global Health Delivery Center in Dubai where my mentor was working on sending reminders for vaccination appointments in low- and middle-income countries. They were extremely cost effective in increasing the uptake of vaccines. I thought about a similar model for refugees in

Turkey. We decided to design a simple app that forms a bridge between the population and the available healthcare services.

Any plans to expand outside of Turkey?

Yes! HERA is fully open-sourced, replicable and modifiable to respond to the local needs in other countries. Displacement is increasing globally, and our health systems are not designed for people on the move, so we need solutions like HERA, which can “move with the person.” We piloted HERA in Nebraska with Afghan refugees in 2022, and we have plans to pilot in Ghana and Ethiopia in early 2023.

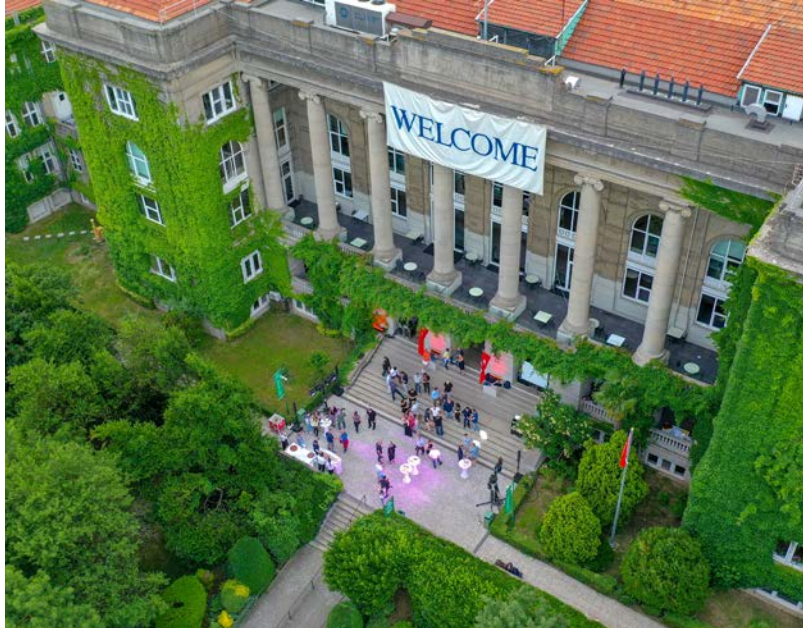

RC's Beloved Çiğdem Yazıcıoğlu Shines on in New Chapter

Known as "Çiğdem Abla" of the Orta Office in the 1980s, Çiğdem Yazıcıoğlu later became an invaluable member of the RC Development Office and worked at RC for 31 years until her retirement in 2018 (see RCQ 52, p. 55). As she started enjoying her retirement through art and travel, her first chapter abruptly ended during a horse-riding safari in Africa. She now chronicles her second chapter in her Instagram account "ikincihayatim" and shines like a beacon of light, hope, and inspiration for the quadrigenic community.

Yazıcıoğlu was thrown off her horse in Masai Mara, Kenya, when the

I was a positive person in my first chapter, and I choose to be positive in my second chapter. How can I be negative, when there has been such an outpouring of love and support from all around?"

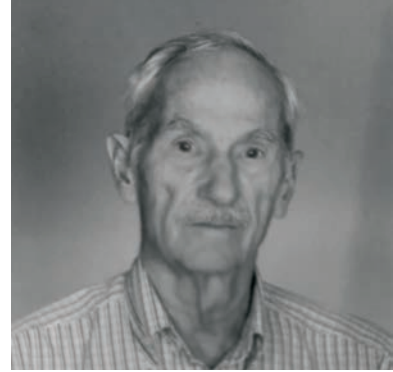


Aydın Tlabar RC ENG 55

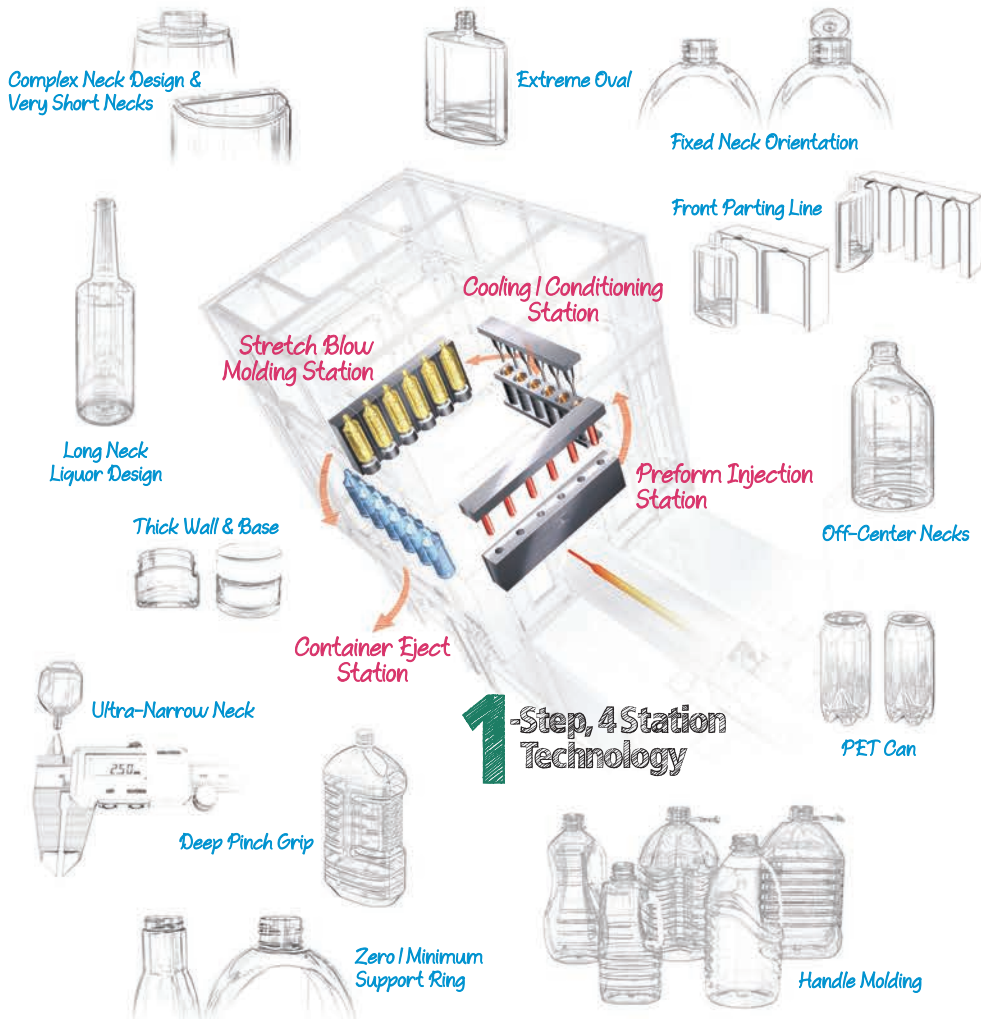

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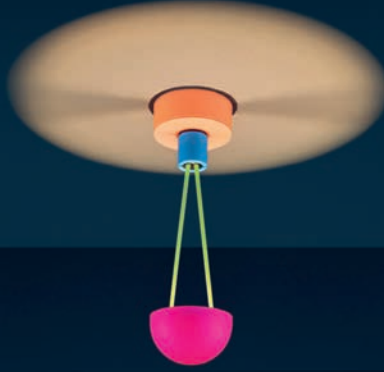
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
