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## Hellos and Goodbyes at RC

As Adam Oliver's tenure as Head of School wraps up, he leaves behind a legacy of student support, academic achievement, and resilience through challenging times. Taking over from him is Whitman Shepard, a familiar face to the RC community with deep roots in the school.

#### **Adam Oliver Bids Farewell After Six Years**

Head of School Adam Oliver's six-year tenure at RC ends in 2025. Looking back, Oliver is most proud of team accomplishments: "They're all part of the Strategic Plan, co-written across the community. The last two years have seen us set school records for university placements at the world's top 100 colleges, and we're set to go even higher this year. We have revolutionized welfare and personal development support at RC. We've combined disparate elements into one program called GROW, which includes the new 'RC Scholar' student profile, a whole new subject - 'Well-being', and better safeguarding to protect our students. We've also evolved as a global leader in Regenerative Education. In addition, as the many recent alumni know, we shouldn't

forget that thanks to my dog Chloe we are now a dog-friendly school."

Oliver faced challenging external circumstances during his tenure: "The worst of those was the Covid-19 pandemic. Suddenly our decisions were not about how to improve learning but rather how to keep everyone safe from harm. Soon after that we faced the aftermath of the February 2023 earthquake, which devastated communities and claimed the lives of loved ones among our students, teachers and staff. The major economic downturn of the last three years has also presented huge challenges for RC and all our employees."

Oliver's lasting message to the RC community represents the main tenets of his leadership: "Be warm and loving and human in all you do and remember the relationships that really matter."

#### Whitman Shepard Returns to RC -This Time as Interim Head of School

RCQ asked Whitman Shepard about the journey that brought him back to RC as Interim Head of School:

"I arrived at Robert College in August 1983. My wife, Bengü Shepard, preceded me by two months. I began as a math teacher and became department head and athletic director. Following my MEd degree from Harvard, I was asked to take on the position of Lise Director, a role that I held for seven years. Bengü served the school as registrar, assistant international counselor and Turkish college counselor. After 18 years of service, we left RC in 2001. We continued to work in Türkiye until

2017 when we moved to the States to be closer to our daughter. A surprise phone call in December has resulted in our rejoining the RC community. The congratulations and words of support from RC graduates have confirmed that we are making the right choice. I am eager to use my experience to sustain and enrich the academic and social lives of RC students. The school enjoys an outstanding reputation which must be safeguarded and enhanced. In this regard I welcome the opportunity to collaborate with all members of the community. Upon our return we will reawaken many fond memories of our lives in that special place called Robert College. We are excited to rekindle our relationship with friends and graduates. Furthermore, we are looking forward to making new friends and to getting to know the students who will remain as the focus of the school."

## Yıldız Günay Joins RC as Director of Institutional Advancement

In August 2024, Yıldız Günay joined RC, overseeing the fundraising and communication efforts of the school. An alumnus of Üsküdar American Academy for Girls and Boğazici University, Günay comes to RC from TEV, Türkiye's largest educational foundation, where she was responsible for managing and fundraising for over 10,000 scholarships, three girls' dormitories, and a boarding high school for underprivileged, highpotential students. She is also a board member at Tüpraş, Türk Traktör, and Ünlü & Co. Günay credits her education and career in engineering and finance for shaping her analytical thinking and result-oriented mindset.

Günay states: "In a world more divided than ever, my top priority is to unite the Robert College community into

a stronger, better-connected whole. We frequently share opportunities for alumni to gather, and news of the school's latest initiatives. We encourage everyone to review and

Günay has a powerful message to the RC community: "I come from a family of doctors and naval officers, and I was able to attend Üsküdar American Academy for Girls as a boarding student. Getting the same opportunity is fifteen times harder today, even when adjusted for purchasing power. If you, like me, believe in the power of Robert College's educational excellence to shape lives, I invite you to support the next generation. Your every contribution helps preserve this legacy and nurtures our hope for a prosperous future grounded in Atatürk's principles."

## Soli Özel RC 76 Inspires with Monthly Talks at RC

Writer and academic Soli Özel was a frequent visitor to campus this year, lecturing in classes in addition to giving a series of talks.

In an interview for the RCQ, Özel stated how special it was to return as a teacher and walk the same corridors: "I had two dreams when

I graduated. One was to give the commencement lecture, which I did on the 30th anniversary of my own graduation, and the second was to be able to teach at Robert College. This year I did it and am elated. I'm like, 'Okay, I've accomplished whatever I sought. Now I can retire!' I thank the administration of RC for allowing me to be so happy."

Özel did a series of after school lectures in the Heritage Room and attended comparative government classes. Of the two, he found the Heritage Room talks to be more challenging: "The afternoon sessions were less crowded and attendance was self-selected. Therefore, they were far more demanding and intellectually stimulating."

Özel felt it was important to convey the importance of contextualization and analysis to RC students: "Because I think we are going through an extraordinary time of reconstructing world order and because your generation is going to be living for the next 60 years with whatever is being constructed, I owe it to you as a teacher to give you some elements, which would make it easier for you to understand the dynamics of this new age."

## Deniz Duru RC 05 Shares Her Book and Methodology

Deniz Duru, an associate professor in media and communication at Lund University, wrote an academic, open access book titled *Conviviality in Burgaz: Living, Loving and Fighting on a Diverse Island of Istanbul* (Palgrave MacMillan). The book builds on 15 years of longitudinal,

ethnographic research combining anthropology, media, migration and diversity studies. Burgaz, an island home to more than twenty ethnic and religious groups from different socioeconomic backgrounds, provided an excellent setting to study post-Ottoman conviviality. The book particularly explores the islanders' representation of diversity: how a diverse community of islanders lives together and manages tensions and conflicts.

Duru recently presented the fieldwork methodology she used in the book for an AP English class's field study assignment. Duru found it fantastic to be back at RC: "I was impressed by students' critical questions and attention to detail, showing active engagement and curiosity. They asked about how to approach and interview people they did not know before, how to build a rapport with them, what kinds of topics to explore for their field study projects and how researchers tackle personal biases while conducting social scientific qualitative research."

Duru recalls her own time at RC fondly: "We were all unique in a diverse environment. We were given the space to find out, and the courage to follow what we would love to do in our lives. This made me realize I had a passion for anthropology and understanding human diversity, and I chose an academic career."

## A Groundbreaking Investment Event for RC Students

Entrepreneurial spirit has always thrived at Robert College, but this year it reached a whole other level with RC Bobcat's Den, where RC alumni entrepreneurs invest real money into startups founded by current students. Two members of the Class of 2025, Mert Kaan Atan and Emir Çelet lead this initiative, a first—not only for RC but for Türkiye.

Bobcat's Den unfolds in two stages: an initial pre-elimination round,

followed by the final competition, where the most promising startups pitch their ideas to a panel of seasoned RC alumni investors. These investors offer real financial backing to those student-founded ventures with potential.

Beyond the competition, Bobcat's Den offers students an opportunity to receive mentorship from RC alumni. This mentorship strengthens the bond between different generations of

graduates while equipping students with the knowledge and skills for success.

The first Bobcat's Den took place on April 16, 2025, with Selin Dilmener RC 03, Burcu Göbülük RC 00, Firat İşbecer RC 98 and Ersan Öztürk RC 94 as investors and six pitching startups.

Selin Dilmener had the following to say after the event: "It was an incredible source of pride for me to see RC students become active participants in the startup ecosystem while still in high school. The presentations were impressive in both content and delivery. The ideas were creative; the participants were so professional and confident that they were no different from those already in the business world! These young people have strengthened our hopes for the future."

## Returning to RC as a Graduate

Alper Koç RC 24 experiences a different side of the school in the IA Office.

A few months after graduating in 2024, Alper Koc returned to campus as an intern in the Institutional Advancement Office. For him, returning to RC as a staff member has been a unique experience: "Being able to return to campus so soon after graduating has been incredibly valuable for me. After spending five years as a boarding student, I thought I knew everything about RC. However, working with the Institutional Advancement Office showed me just how much behindthe-scenes effort goes into running the school. Also, the warm and welcoming environment of the IA Office - what the late Cyrus Carter once called 'RC's Fuel Source' - has made my work even more enjoyable."

For the first time in its 16-year history, the Prof. Seyhan Nurettin Eğe ACG 49 Excellence in Science Award for Girls ceremony was held without its founder, Güneş Eğe Akter ACG 52, who passed away in January (see her obituary on p. 74). Whether in person or, in later years, via Zoom, Güneş Hanım was always a presence at the ceremony, celebrating the achievements of young women excelling in science.

This year's award was presented to Melis Kekeç L11, a promising young scientist who recently became a regional runner-up in the TÜBİTAK competition. The presentation, held at the Flag Ceremony on March 17, 2025, was attended by Melis' proud family, faculty members, and students. Last year's recipient, Tülin Ada Sönmezer L12, was also present to support the new awardee, continuing the tradition of recognizing and encouraging excellence in science.

The keynote speaker for the event was Ayse Büyüktür RC 97, Associate Director of Health & Social Equity Programs at the Center for Health and Research Transformation. In her address, she highlighted the critical role of women in scientific fields: "The importance of having women in science is not only about equality of opportunity, though that is perhaps the most obvious reason. People tend to pursue questions that interest them and try to solve problems that affect them. If half the population is not represented in a field of study, their questions go unanswered and their problems unaddressed. This has been historically so in the health sciences. Women's health issues were not a part of medical research until more women started entering the field."


She further emphasized the broader impact of diversity in science, adding: "Enabling more women to participate

in the sciences will increase the talent pool, as evidenced by the historically groundbreaking work of people such as Marie Curie, Rosalind Franklin, and Katherine Johnson."





## Building Bridges Through Transformative Projects

Projects run by the Community Involvement Program (CIP) connect RC students with different communities around Türkiye. Here are highlights of projects from the past year.

#### From Lounge to Library: The **Aksu CIP Continues to Grow**

As the CIP Office continues to carry out projects over the years, connections deepen and become more meaningful with time. Cihadiye Middle School in Aksu-Antalya exemplified this meaningful connection this year. In 2018, the first CIP project was conducted there, focusing on improving the school library. RC students raised funds, renovated the space, and organized workshops on creative reading and science. At the beginning of this year, a university student contacted the CIP Office, explaining that he had participated in that library project years ago as a middle school student and now wanted to collaborate with RC on a new project through his university club. This January, a one-week CIP project was carried out in collaboration with students and lecturers from Antalya Bilim University. The outcome was a graphic novel booklet created by middle school students with the support of RC students. These

multilayered connections and the fact that children grow up with memories of CIP projects make community service activities even more meaningful for our current students.

#### **A Shared Love of Service**

CIP projects sometimes begin with an impromptu chat. One day, music teacher and level dean Koray Demirkapı mentioned the vocational school where his cousin works-Rauf Denktas Vocational and Technical

Anatolian High School (RDTMAL) in Pendik-and their communityoriented work. The students there use their crafts to improve conditions in their community, specializing in areas such as photography, graphic design, hairdressing, and childcare. RC students were eager to meet these talented students, engage with them, and collaborate on a project to improve their environment. In November 2024, students from both schools came together and transformed a school corridor into a library. They shared their service experiences, created murals on the walls, organized and classified books on the shelves, and registered them in an online cataloging system. Through this collaboration, a strong sense of cooperation and friendship developed between the students of both schools.

#### **Apis mellifera Club CIP**

The CIP Office and the Apis mellifera Club collaborated once again this fall. As part of their social responsibility project, club students traveled to Salihli, Manisa, where they met with women beekeepers at the Köprübası Hanimeli Cooperative. They organized workshops on making beeswax, propolis, cream, and reusable food wraps. It was an incredible

We are striving to ensure the continuity and sustainability of this project, which aims to provide multifaceted benefits to the environment.

#### Gaziantep Art Camp – a Collaboration with **INARA**

In the summer of 2024, partnership with INARA, co-founded by our esteemed alumnus, journalist Arwa Damon RC 94, we launched a meaningful project supporting children affected by war. For a week, our students led an art summer camp in Gaziantep, inspiring boundless creativity and new ways to express emotions.

Another memorable moment of the project was visiting another RC alumnus, Nüket Alevli Ersoy ACG 50, the founder and administrator of Gaziantep College Foundation Private Schools. Our students and advisors had the opportunity to chat with her about our school, RC memories, and her work in education, making it a truly special experience.

RC students reached out to approximately 780 people in 12 different cities and numerous dogs at various shelters in İstanbul.

The more prepared you are for what you can foresee, the more energy and resilience you have to handle the unexpected."

Dormen transferred to RC from Galatasaray Lisesi in Orta, already bitten by the theater bug. All he wanted was to be involved in theater. Therefore, he applied to the Theater Club, as soon as he arrived at RC. The president of the club at the time

was Refik Erduran RC 47, who went onto to become one of the foremost playwrights of Turkish theater. It was Erduran who convinced the members of the club to let the newcomer in.

so that "he would see how difficult theater was and learn his lesson."

Dormen learned his lesson well and indeed has no intention to retire just yet. In a recent interview with T24 he emphasized that he does not have time for aging or tiring. An article with 10haber stated that Dormen's number one requirement for a career in theater is passion: "Dedication is of utmost importance. No room for desperation. Situations may arise that cause desperation, but as artists we should not give in."

Dormen continues to light the way, particularly through his school Dormen Akademi, where he passes the theater bug onto new generations.

## Göksel Kortay ACG 55 Celebrates Her 60th Anniversary in Art

Sixty years of dedication in art is remarkable, and Göksel Kortay was duly showered with celebrations. The first was at the gala of the play she directed, *İkinin İkisi (Out of Order)* by Ray Cooney. After the closing curtain,

Antalya Altın Portakal (Golden Orange) Film Festival also honored Kortay, after a screening of the film *Fidan* (*Sapling*), of which she is among the cast. Kortay received her plaque from BİROY (Association for Screen Actors) Head Renan Bilek, who said Kortay represents the contemporary Turkish woman through her intellectual depth and elegance.

Kortay was emotional in her acceptance speech: "60 years means a whole lifetime. In this lifetime, there is acting, directing, teaching, emceeing, translating, dubbing

and trade unions." Kortay dedicated the award to all women who tirelessly go after their dreams and who achieve them on their own.

Kortav received the Lifetime Achievement Award from Sadri Alısık Theater and Cinema Awards and was previously presented the Women of the Republic of Türkive Award from the Bedia Muvahhit Awards in 2023: "It was given for the first time to me. After me, the second one was given to Prof. Oya Basak ACG 55. I'm very proud of it. It symbolizes a woman born into the Republic, who lives by the standards of the Republic and who is a follower of Atatürk - a rich meaning."

## RC and Literature: An Ever-Lasting Love

English and Turkish literature constitute one of the main tenets of an RC education. Literature not only develops analytical and critical thinking, clear, concise, impactful speaking and writing skills, it also offers students a way to discover themselves and make sense of the world. Appreciation of literature and a habit of reading for pleasure are lifelong gifts that keep on giving, gifts that RC students take away with them when they graduate. In this issue, RCQ puts the spotlight on this beloved subject, from the current curricula to literary alumni.



#### When remembering RC, it

is virtually impossible for an alumnus not to recall a book he read in class and how it fundamentally altered something in him. It can be a classic like Sophocles' Antigone, or a story like Flowers for Algernon, a poem perhaps, whose opening lines have long been committed to memory (What happens to a dream deferred?) or a book like 1984 or Animal Farm that made him question the world. An alumnus may recall how rigorous the literary discussions were and how hard it was to write papers, as she breezes through reports or composes impactful emails and presentations at work. Without a doubt, learning about literature at RC is a life-changing experience.

#### Depth, Breadth and Interdisciplinary Approach

Over the decades, RC literature classes have covered classics and canonical works, as well as contemporary literature in a spirit of discussion and self-expression. Often the approach has been interdisciplinary for a richer appreciation of literature. The Arts, Science and Literature class, being taught at RC for well over 40 years,

is a prime example. In this class, the visual arts, architecture and cultural history are brought together. A curriculum from 1986 shows that science weighed in about the arches for Roman architecture; vellum and ink production were discussed around medieval manuscripts. Students in this class today continue to study such seminal work as *The Odyssey*, Dante's *Inferno*, *The Song of Roland*, *Don Quixote*, *Moby Dick*, and Virginia Woolf's *Orlando*.

#### **Literary Teachers**

A literature education that goes beyond knowledge into appreciation and indeed love is possible only with inspiring teachers. Eminent academic Ova Basak ACG 55 recalls some of them fondly: "I had two magnificent English teachers. Fahir İz was a special professor and chairperson who showed us the incredible variety of 'words, words,' as Hamlet says. Dorothy iz taught me some of the most important things one needs to know about world literature. She had unbelievable insight into the texts and amazing capability to tie two different plays with subtle differences between them. She inspired all of us. My teachers led me to light and to a place of feeling, of the camaraderie

between humans. Shakespeare himself says this: 'All men make faults, and even I in this/Authorizing thy trespass with compare.' (Sonnet Nr 35)." RC also often had literature teachers who themselves were writers. Tevfik Fikret, Halide Edip Adıvar, Faruk Nafiz Çamlıbel, Behçet Kemal Çağlar, and Refik Halit Karay are some of the historical literary names who graced the RC halls.

#### The Library: A Treasure Chest

RC libraries have always augmented literature education. Both ACG and RC libraries started out modestly. Harvard University's donation of 200 volumes in the beginning was a notable addition to the nascent collection. By 1957 though, the Robert College Library had 111,598 books and 214 periodicals, and the ACG Library 27,163 books and 108 periodicals. The library lived on in many iterations through the decades and reached its present form in 1996. Throughout the years, with the newspapers, magazines, and vast English and Turkish collections, a student who started on the path of literary discovery would have been as delighted with the level of access and special environment that RC Libraries provided, as they are today. Indeed, poet and translator Efe Murad RC 06 sums the role of the library and RC librarians on student life perfectly: "As a prep student, I discovered the treasure of books by rebellious poets like Arthur Rimbaud and Allen Ginsberg in the library, which felt like a revelation. This experience ignited my passion for future literary discoveries, and I must acknowledge the generosity of the librarians Ayşe Yüksel ACG 69 and Şiir Tursan ACG 70 for their guidance. It was there that I first began to understand the importance of language-not just as a tool for communication, but as a vessel for exploring and conveying the complexities of human experience."

Today the İbrahim Bodur Library works closely with teachers to support course development and enrichment. It aligns its resources with their curriculum,

ensuring students have access to materials that support and enhance their learning. This effort includes curating collections of books, articles, and online resources. The Library staff also teach students essential research skills, provide guidance on effectively using both print and digital resources, and offer instruction on citations, resource evaluation, and academic honesty.

#### Literary Publications and Competitions Encourage Budding Writers









The chance to practice one's hand at creative writing has always been encouraged at RC. Over the decades, there have been numerous publications such as Çağrı and Objective that featured student writing in different genres like poetry, short story, journalism. The tradition continues and expands. Now there is even a magazine for graphic novels. The literary club Oda (Room) publishes the Oda magazine once a year. Each year the students in the club choose a theme. The 2025 theme is "Transformation" RC Turkish

Literature teacher and club advisor Sengül Özdemir says that the selected work is in line with the theme and can be in any genre, and all RC students are invited to contribute. All work is shared on a drive and club members constructively critique the pieces. Contributors develop their work, based on the feedback. The club demonstrates how writing is a process and how it gets better, as one writes more. Another publication is Marti (Seagull) which features creative writing, like poetry and stories.

The tradition of literary competition is also strong at RC. The Çağrı Poetry Competition of the 1980s often featured stellar literary names heading the jury, such as Sabahattin Kudret Aksal. Currently the Jane Page Competition in English and Marti magazine's story and poetry competition in Turkish, in its 16th year in 2025, garner lively participation. The theme of the 2025 Marti competition is "Discovery." Özlem Kaynar and Özgül Akgül, RC Turkish Literature teachers and club advisors, explain that the need for self- expression drive the students to send their work to the competition: "The participants are evaluated by a jury comprised of literature teachers. The best three are awarded in a special event and get published in the magazine. In order for a writer to find her voice, she has to listen to herself, try to understand different perspectives and evaluate her own work. Marti is not just a publication club, it is also a workshop aiming to discover budding writers. "

The Jane Page English Writing Competition started after Maura Kelly won the teaching honor with the same honorific in 2009. Kelly elaborates:

"Knowing that many famous authors like Sylvia Plath won writing competitions early in their careers, even as high school students, I realized this would be an effective

way to encourage RC students to put pen to paper or finger to keyboard. Contests challenge a student to share their writing publicly and to perhaps polish a draft they haven't completed. The prize money remains generous-\$300 per category: short fiction, short script, and poetry. My favorite part of the JPWC is the ceremony where winning entries are read by the student's own English teacher. It is so moving and incredible to see the pride in both the teacher's expression and the honor for the student to have their work read out loud in the Bodur Library each spring.

"Each year we have a significant number of entries for short stories and poetry which evidences student interest. Film and Literature courses, Creative Writing and Modern Drama electives cultivate contributions. Students enjoy the recognition they receive at the ceremony and when published in RC magazines."

#### Alumni and Teacher Authors Abound

Challenging curricula, superb teachers, the library, the tradition of student publications and competitions - indeed an ideal educational environment for future writers! No wonder so many emerged from RC. Halide Edip Adıvar ACG 1901, Halikarnas Balıkçısı (Cevat Şakir Kabaağaçlı) RC 1904, Bülent Ecevit RC 44, Tomris Uyar ACG 61, Pınar Kür RC YÜK 63, Ayse Kulin ACG 61,

Aslı Erdoğan RC 84, Lale Müldür RC 75, Roni Margulies RC 72, Mina Urgan ACG 35, Gündüz Vassaf RA 64, Nihal Yeğinobalı ACG 45, İpek Ongun ACG 61, Hikmet Hükümenoğlu RC 89, Cem Akaş RC 86 and of course the Nobel Laureate Orhan Pamuk RA 70 are among the prominent literary figures who are also RC graduates. Abdülhak Hamit Tarhan also attended RC, though he did not graduate. Moreover, many RC graduates joined the ranks of academia and contributed to literature in this meaningful way. Berna Moran, Şiar Yalçın RC 43, Memet Fuat RC 44, Özdemir Nutku RC 50, Aziz Çalışlar RA 61. Talat Sait Halman RC 51. Jale Parla ACG 64 are among this choice group. Some, like Cevat Çapan RC 53 and Maureen Freely ACG 71, are writers, academics, and literary translators!

In the literary climate of RC it is no wonder that some teachers ventured into writing as well, particularly nonfiction. Colin Edmonds, who was with RC for 43 years, started out teaching Prep and later became the Computer Science Coordinator. He taught his own book, The Social Issues in Computing, which he wrote back in 2008 and published online for free (it is still available here: www.cedmonds.net/ dl/sibook.html) History teacher Önder Kaya, philosophy teacher Ezgi Emel Kalyoncu RC 10 and former Turkish Language and Literature teacher Adil İzci are also prolific writers.

### RC Literature Education Today

The breadth of areas covered in both English and Turkish literature classes, the wide range of literary electives and publications continue to be a source of pride. Members of the RC community elaborate on the state of affairs in language and literature education at

RC, and the picture that emerges is dazzling indeed.

#### English Department Head Angela Shockley and Assistant English Department Head Ana Shaw Reveal the Ins and Outs of the RC English Program

"Our job as teachers is to get students thinking critically and exploring novels they wouldn't normally read."

### What are the aims of RC's English Literature program?

The English Department at Robert College contributes to students' intellectual development by teaching them a spectrum of essential to more sophisticated, nuanced language and literature skills. Fluency in English is a primary goal. We also aspire to encompass 21st Century Fluencies: information. creativity, solution, and collaboration. We put an emphasis on insightful thinking, imaginative and academic writing, collaborative discussion, group work and careful, close reading. A range of literary and non-literary works are used as a springboard to hone our students' skills. We value thoughtful reading for class-specific needs and for the larger good of exploring the complex human experience with a growth mindset, as well as how to be more self-aware as consumers of information to ensure they are conscious of the nuances. We teach essential elements of effective writing such as grammar and essay structure, but we also emphasize writing as a way of exploring and developing one's ideas. We ask that students refine and articulate their ideas through authentic production such as debates, academic conversations

multi-media text, academic posters and blogs.

## How are students exposed to literature in the English Prep program?

The Lise Prep English course is an "Introduction to RC Course." We support English language development age-appropriate literature learning opportunities. Students read texts like American Born Chinese, a graphic novel, which is deceptively rich in approaches to learning. It contains multiple perspectives with a shifting protagonist. In the exploration of any graphic novel, words are only a small part of the reading experience. Students learn how to read text features, like graphic weight and framing techniques, and how those visual text features help

an author convey a message. Students also participate in research. Most recently in Prep English Language class, our students explored an environmental based issue, drawing from knowledge gained in the science class during the first semester. Their topics ranged from addressing the stray cat population on campus to implementing an entirely plant-based lunch in the MKSC. Students, working in groups, created a question as a focus, researched multiple perspectives for answers, and then participated in a debate with other sections. We also explore literature from an experiential and transdisciplinary perspective, introducing them to the most exciting parts of RC as a whole. For example, Lise Prep students are provided with several learning opportunities fulfilling the demands of our bespoke Atatürk Explorer program, supported by the Head of Adventure Educational Learning and the Dean Innovation and Regenerative Education. Activities involve the climbing wall, Augmented Reality activities, and exploring published scientific research. The students are then given structured opportunities to reflect and communicate their learning.

What is a favorite book you teach? Angela Shockley: Every book I teach to students at any moment is my favorite. What I truly love is when students "get it." At the moment I'm teaching Moby Dick to my Art, Science, and Literature 2 class. Moby Dick has an imposing reputation that can intimidate even the strongest of readers. I love taking the students through the text and have them say "this is so relevant" to their lives. I've seen the same thing happen with The Odyssey and Macbeth and countless others.

Ana Shaw: I love teaching literature. It would be The Outsiders, Pride and Prejudice, The Catcher in the Rye and Circe. Authors Jason Reynolds and Nicola Yoon for short stories, or some classics like Roald Dahl.

### Which books are the current student favorites?

Murder mysteries, novels by Karen McManus and Kara Thomas, but the perennial favorite is Agatha Christie. Students also love Rick Riordan who uses Greek, Egyptian, and Norse mythology in contemporary settings with young protagonists. The current pattern in young adult literature is very appealing to students. It shows that they can change the world, no matter their age. Small things can make a big difference. If a student is reading, we see it as a win.

#### Maura Kelly -Dean of Faculty, former English Department Head

"In order to be good at writing, you must be a reader."

Maura Kelly has been with RC for 26 years and illuminates how RC cultivates good reading and writing skills in students, despite the challenges and distractions this century puts up along the way:

"Reading as a habit has declined over the past decade. There are many reports and articles being released with provocative titles like, Rose Horowitch's Atlantic piece, 'The Elite College Students Who Can't Read Books.' Jonathan Malesic's op-ed essay for the NY Times entitled "There's a Very Good Reason Why College Students Don't Read," credits screens, Covid, and AI for the demise of reading. Sadly, as educators, we know the power of reading and its effect on empathy, critical thinking, vocabulary, and writing skills.

"To counteract the decline in reading we start strongly in the LP year to instill a reading habit in our students. Time is scheduled weekly for students to select personal reading choices with the guidance of their teachers and the librarians. There is a section in the south wing of the library dedicated to Literature Circles titles which allows groups of students to read the same book and to discuss their understandings. This focused reading practice continues in L9, and studentchoice is strongly encouraged. In the upper-years, courses have several required texts per semester. The Ibrahim Bodur Library inspires us all daily by making our library the heart of the school.

"Finally, a quote from Annie Lamott – her fantastic book on writing, *Bird by Bird* is an incredible testimony to reading:

'Writing and reading decrease our sense of isolation. They deepen and widen and expand our sense of life: They feed the soul. When writers make us shake our heads with the exactness of their prose and their truths, and even make us laugh about ourselves or life, our buoyancy is restored. We are given a shot at dancing with, or at least clapping along with, the absurdity of life, instead of being squashed by it over and over again. It's like singing on a boat during a terrible storm at sea. You can't stop the raging storm, but singing can change the hearts and spirits of the people who are together on that ship."

#### **Books Taught in the RC English Program**

The texts selected for the RC English program are chosen to be intellectually engaging, appropriately challenging, and diverse—in genre, form, culture, and content—in order to develop self-reflective, critical, socially-aware, and empathetic students who are knowledgeable about a wide range of aspects of the human experience. The Turkish Ministry of Education chooses texts and allows the schools to use resources that enrich the curriculum. The curriculum balances foundational and contemporary texts that allow students to recognize patterns and build connections, appreciating and evaluating storytelling as art that is crafted for specific effects.

#### Mehmet Uysal - Turkish Language and Literature Department Head

"We want our students to be sensitive to their native language."

Mehmet Uysal has been with RC for 44 years and has been the Turkish Language and Literature Department Head since 2002. He gives a wealth of information on the Turkish Language and Literature curriculum at RC:

"The Turkish Language and Literature Department aims for our students to learn and use their native language at the highest possible level. We also want our students to become adults who question and discuss issues. Finally, as a multicultural school, we want our students to uphold national and universal values. All the work in our classes supports these intentions. If you ask what our top departmental priority is, I would say it is for our students to use Turkish in the most correct, proper and beautiful way and to be sensitive to their native language.

"Our classes are in line with the Ministry of Education curricula, today and in the past. We adapt to changes brought in by MEB, keeping the RC learning philosophy and approach intact. Currently, starting with prep, all Turkish Language and Literature classes are obligatory. During Prep, a particular highlight are the workshops that foster student creativity through reading and writing. In 9th grade, genres are explored through themes. In 10th grade, the focus shifts to the relationship between language and history, genres like novels, stories, memoirs, journalism and travel writing are further explored. Eleventh grade looks into the relationship of literature with society, essays, plays, criticism join the genres reviewed. 12th grade is when students

learn about different movements, and they also study 'Nutuk' (Atatürk's 'A Speech').

"Reading and writing well help the students develop intellectual richness and critical thinking. Writing well depends on reading well. We aim for our students to become good literary readers, structural thinkers who articulate their thoughts clearly. We support their learning through good examples. Now that the students arrive at RC during Lise, as opposed to Orta, there is a change in the level of preparedness to becoming Lise students."

#### Turkish Culture and Literature Symposium Celebrates 20 Years

RC took the lead in the Turkish educational sphere and established the Turkish Culture and Literature Symposium back in 2005. The foundational objective of the Symposium was to gather writers, students, teachers and literature teachers from RC and around Türkiye, highlight a theme and draw the attention of teachers to this theme. The fact that the symposium reached its 20th year in 2025 is a testament to RC's enduring support of literature and

the arts, as well as the hard work of the Turkish Language and Literature Department. Previous years' themes included Novel in Turkish Literature, Literature and Artificial Intelligence, and Fantasy Literature. One of the highlights in the past was the symposium on Orhan Pamuk, where the Nobel Laureate himself attended and put up the plaque on the wall of the classroom, named after him. The theme for the 2025 event is the legacy of the great actor and RC alumnus Genco Erkal RC 57.

### What activities does the Library organize to promote reading?

We organize a week-long celebration called Literary Week filled with themed events and activities, collaborating with teachers and students to inspire a love for reading and foster awareness and appreciation of the literary world within the RC community.

A highlight of this week is Book Character Costume Day, where students are invited to dress as a favorite book character. It is a chance for students to show their creativity and for collaboration (group costumes based on a novel or story) while also strengthening connections with the school's curriculum. The group photo, music, popcorn, and voting system further enhance the sense of community, making reading an enjoyable and social experience.

The Book Exchange Table encourages students to share books they no longer need while discovering new ones. This exchange fosters an appreciation for diverse genres and authors. It also promotes a sense of ownership over their reading choices and strengthens peer connections.

Yet another Literary Week event is a trivia game, where students engage with questions based on books they've read. This interactive activity encourages friendly competition while testing students' knowledge

and understanding of various literary works

This year, we showed *Howl's Moving Castle*, based on a fantasy novel by Diana Wynne Jone. This screening offered students an opportunity to analyze storytelling across different formats. The cozy setting of the library's Grand Hall and the social experience of movie night connected students with literature in an engaging way.

In addition, we have Accelerated Reader for Preps, a structured reading program that helps to motivate our Prep students to read and tracks their progress.

We also curate eye-catching book displays throughout the year to showcase a wide variety of titles, sparking curiosity and interest among readers.

### Authors Visits Enhance Literary Appreciation

Every year students are able to meet with authors and learn more about their craft. Authors share their experiences and inspire readers with their stories and creative journeys. Writers who have visited RC in recent years include Orhan Pamuk RA 70, Zülfü Livaneli, Ahmet Ümit, Mario Levi, Hikmet Hükümenoğlu RC 89, Deniz Duru RC 05, Soli Özel RC 76, Matt Dickinson and Rosalind Wiseman.

### How do you decide which books to purchase?

We have a collection development and selection policy. By collaborating closely with teachers, we identify materials that complement their lesson plans, making the library an essential resource for classroom instruction. We also consider students' interests through recommendation forms,

surveys and conversations. In addition, we provide resources like SAT, AP, and YKS books to support our students.

To maintain high quality, we rely on reviews and lists in trusted well-known journals, magazines, newspapers and websites, and we monitor prestigious book awards. We also stay current with emerging trends in young adult literature. In order to keep our collection accessible 24/7, we've also included eBooks, audiobooks, and online tools.

### What's an unusual thing that's happened in the Library?

RC Librarians have been collecting the things that our users have forgotten in our books for many years. From this the *Things You Forgot in Our Books* exhibition was born. Over the years we have found photographs, tickets, money, notes, flowers and many more. One of the residential students found a note in the exhibition that she had written when she was in middle school. It reminded us that books, too, travel and follow their owners!

### How has digitization impacted readership?

By transforming how readers access, consume, and interact with content, digitization has reshaped reading habits, broadened access, and diversified opportunities for engagement. Unfortunately, though, our attention span and deep reading skills have been negatively affected by the immediate and bite-sized content available on digital devices.

One of the significant advantages of digitization was the ability to expand and adapt our services during challenging times. For example, during the pandemic, we significantly grew our eBook collection. This initiative not only helped bridge the gap created by the physical library closure but also reinforced our commitment to providing equitable access to knowledge and resources.

### Do students ask for your recommendations?

Absolutely yes! We enjoy helping them discover books that align with their

interests, while also encouraging them to explore new genres and ideas.

### How would you evaluate the interest towards magazines?

Our patrons enjoy the physical magazines, especially in subjects like science, literature, and current

events. The use of digital magazines is increasing. We collaborate with the Turkish Literature Department to raise awareness of literary magazines among students. As part of the prep curriculum, students visit the library, review a literary magazine in groups, and then present their findings in the classroom.

### How can alumni use the Library?

Alumni have the option to become library members for a small fee. Once they are members, they can check out up to two books at a time for three weeks. This provides them with continued access to valuable resources and supports their lifelong learning.

#### Can alumni donate books?

We don't actively seek donations for a number of reasons but primarily because of the age and condition of the books being donated. The donation process for our library begins by asking alumni to provide a list of the books along with information on their physical condition. We then carefully review the list and select titles that are not already in our collection, ensuring they align with our goals of supporting student learning and personal growth.

# RC Librarians Remember the Many Iterations of the RC Library

### Ayşe Durukan Yüksel ACG 69 (Librarian from 1980-2013)

As an ACG student I was fascinated by the print and LP collections: being a border, I used to stay in the library till 10:00 pm. "Come take choice of all my library, and so beguile thy sorrow" - Shakespeare - Titus Andronicus. The library offered a cultural feast. It was a two-story structure, the upper floor offering the most beautiful scenery of the Bosphorus. It also had a secret door which enabled access to the adjacent assembly hall, so that every Monday when a visitor was to give a speech to the students, the librarians would sneak out to join. James Baldwin's presence was a highlight.

In 1980 I started working as a librarian at the same place, the Gould and the Bingham Hall libraries. The collection had grown; the magazines and LPs were still there. In 1997 the tremendous change came. The card catalog - the wooden cabinet with drawers - was replaced by Follett-Destiny: computers. We spent a lot of time on deciding the right software. The music collection LPs, cassettes, print encyclopedias and dictionaries had to retire. The main purpose, managing the collection and keeping in touch with the community, remained. We invited many writers to exchange views: Haldun Dormen RC 49, Tomris Uyar ACG 61, Hilmi Yavuz, Buket Uzuner and Tuna Kiremitçi are just a few. Kerem Görsev even gave a concert. We held so many different activities to welcome students to the library. We made heart shaped cookies with OKU & READ written on them. The library holds a lot of firsts

among which is the first National School Librarians' conference that was held in July 2003.

### Şiir Tursan ACG 70 (Librarian from 1988-2015)

My first acquaintance with the RC library begins with Bingham Hall Orta Library on the ACG campus in 1962. Though not particularly technological, it was a very rich library. In 1987, when I started working at the library on the same campus which had become Robert College, record players, records and chips were the only technological devices. Then came IBM computers, but the card catalog was kept for a long time, before books were added to the computer system. In the 1990s digitalization started taking over. Record players and records were replaced by video cassettes, then computer disks. In the early 2000s the card catalog was cancelled with tears from the librarians. After entering around 10,000 books into the computer, all information was

lost due to a technical problem at the Computer Center! We had to start entering books into the system all over again. In the meantime, the Orta Library was merged with Lise library. An alarm system was installed at the entrance of the library, replacing the past honor system. We had to adjust each of the 50,000 books one by one according to the alarm system. Video cassettes were replaced by CDs and DVDs. IBM computers were replaced by laptops. The rustic and cozy library of my time was renovated and became a modern library full of technology. Instead of cataloging each book individually, books are now received with full cataloging information online.

### iffet Özseven ACG 66 (Librarian from 1988-2009)

I loved our library as a student, so to have the chance to work there was a privilege for me. It was nice to be able to help students. The collection of books was marvelous. We were getting around 100 periodicals.

### Former RC Teachers Recall Favorite Literature Moments

# Betsy Göksel (English teacher from 1962-1997)

"It was a joy to have such freedom and such closeness."

Betsy Göksel taught literature for over 35 years at Robert College. When RCQ asked her to choose some favorite moments Göksel said it was virtually impossible because she loved so very many, but here are some highlights nonetheless:

"It was so much fun to teach Graham Greene's *Our Man in Havana* – the setting, the characters, the ironies, the ambiguities, the mature debates it inspired. I also loved teaching Shakespeare at the Orta 3, Lise 1 level—*Julius Caesar, Romeo and Juliet* - and having students learn by heart lines from 'The Ancient Mariner."

"The plays in Bingham 1 like I Remember Mama and The House of Bernardo Alba stand out as literary activities. 'Poetry Day' in collaboration with the Turkish teachers was wonderful, one poem in English, followed by one in Turkish.

"As for classes, my Lise 3 Oral English class of 1987-88 stands out in my memory. It was an elective never taught before, envisioned with some students so that we could have one more year together. I chose books I loved like *The Plague, Lucky Jim, The Dark Tower, Long Day's Journey into Night.* It was a joy to have such freedom and such closeness."

After RC, Göksel reread the classics: "I 'discovered' Jose Saramago before he won the Nobel Prize and love his novels. I have read, loved, and translated all of Define Suman's novels and think she is a major Turkish writer."

# Diane Özbal (English teacher and testing coordinator from 1972-2021)

"I always had non-fiction units in my

classes for the math and scienceoriented students."

For Diane Özbal, growing up in a family of scientists came in handy at RC:

"I can't live without literature. But I was raised in a family of scientists and engineers. They all read only nonfiction because it was real, logical, full of new ideas and useful scientific knowledge. My own husband (another scientist!) once said to me, 'Why would I want to spend my time reading about fake people and their fake problems?'


"At RC, I recognized so many students who were just like my wonderful family members. I understood them. That's why I developed several nonfiction units for whatever level I was teaching. I especially loved my Senior elective, English for Technology. It was always full of students, often mostly boys, and especially those who were planning to stay in Türkiye for university. They did not want a literature course because, as they told me, 'Mrs. Özbal, there won't be a single literature question on the university entrance exam.'

"I had the background to capture the attention of this kind of student. I found articles on engineering and science that they could not help reading. The class had biographies of scientists and engineers and poetry about Einstein and his theories. It had excerpts from science fiction to discuss whether the science fiction writer got the science right or not.

"The English for Technology elective served a certain kind of scientific mind, a mind that I admired and understood, even if I didn't exactly have it myself."

# Adil İzci (Turkish language and literature teacher from 1980 - 2010)

"I now lead a life among thousands of books. Books keep coming in waiting to be read."

Adil İzci taught Turkish literature at RC for thirty years.

"My favorite period to teach has always been the Republic period. However, classes cover a range of writers and poets of course: Yunus Emre, Karacaoğlan, Bâki, Tevfik Fikret, Yahya Kemal Beyatlı, Yakup Kadri, Sait Faik, Necatigil, Orhan Veli, Oktay Akbal, Sabahattin Kudret Aksal. My favorite may be Sait Faik, particularly his sea and island stories. I generally prefer writers who emphasize aesthetics. Writers like Sabahattin

Kudret Aksal, Talât Sait Halman, Hilmi Yavuz also came as guests to our classes and symposiums.

"I now lead a life among thousands of books. Books keep coming in waiting to be read. Even though I am retired, I still sometimes suggest books to the RC faculty. *Unutma Beni (Forget Me Not)* by Aslı Eti Arlı RC 96 holds a special place in my heart next to Saint-Exupery's *The Little Prince*.

"The residue of my teaching years still guides me in my writing, especially in my stories. Karacaoğlan's lines 'Can alıcı gelmiş canım almaya / Benim can vermeye dermanım mı var?' (The life reaper came to take my life/ Do I have the strength to give it?) found their place in a story I wrote after my mother passed away.

# Yıldız Düzköylü (Turkish language and literature teacher from 1993-2011)

"My term paper homework would be translations. It allowed for the students to develop both their English and Turkish."

Yıldız Düzköylü taught Turkish literature and was the founding advisor for Martı magazine. Here are her highlights from that time:

"Among my favorite books to teach were Sevme Sanatı (The Art of Loving) by Erich Fromm and Martı Jonathan Livingston (Jonathan Livingston Seagull) by Richard Bach. We read all of Sait Faik's stories in tandem with a TV series on TRT (Havada Bulut; Cloud in the Sky) based on them.

We founded a club with my students and started publishing Marti magazine. It comprised of pieces on theater, novel, poetry, interviews, caricatures. We also ran story and poetry competitions, discussion panels and debates.

"I recently prepared presentations for two symposiums together with my colleague at RC, Birol Özdemir: 'Writers Who Are Symbols of Their Own Land: Yaşar Kemal – Çukurova / John Steinbeck – Salinas Valley' and 'Teacher Heroes in Literary Life'. These were published in Novel Heroes magazine.

"In my retirement, I read a lot of writers' memoirs. Recently I was really affected by the book Öğretmenim Morrie'yle Salı Buluşmaları: Hayattaki En Büyük Ders (Tuesdays With Morrie) by Mitch Albom, about the weekly conversations that a retired sociology teacher had with his former student."

# RC Alumni Make Their Mark on Literature

The Turkish literary world sparkles with RC alumni. Writing fiction and non-fiction, teaching and researching in academia, translating valuable works to Turkish and vice versa, RC alumni have contributed to Turkish literature in lasting and significant ways and continue to gather numerous accolades. Here are some of the members of this literary group who answered RCQ's questions for the RC community.

# Ayşe Kulin ACG 61 Believes in the Sensitivity Literature Nurtures

"ACG was an ocean for those who had talents."

Addressing the graduating class in 2012, Ayşe Kulin recalled her gains from ACG fondly: "We blended the self-confidence of the West with the inner discipline of the East, and we gained insight. A self-confidence that doesn't overwhelm others, an awareness devoid of arrogance!" With these riches, Kulin went on to become one of the most widely read authors in Türkiye today.

### What changes does literature instigate?

Literature takes us to places we have not been thus connecting us to all sorts of different cultures, introducing us to all sorts of people all around the world with different lives, habits and expectations. Literature also widens our vision, sensibilities and deepens our feelings. In short, literature widens our horizon making us if not better, definitely more sensitive people.

### Why are you often drawn to historical stories?

That is not entirely true. Out of forty books that I have written only six novels might come under that title. Münir Nurettin, Adı Aylin (Name: Aylin) and Füreya are biographies of people whom I had personally known. Nefes Nefese (Last Train To Istanbul) is recent past - during the Second World War

when I was born. I cannot consider an era where I am present, as history. My only truly historical novel is *Her Yerde Kan Var (Blood Everywhere)* which questions the mysterious death of Sultan Abdülaziz.

### What differentiates fiction from other forms of storytelling?

Fiction supplies writers a large horizon for imagining. We can create different pasts, colorful futures and dystopias like I have done in *Tutsak Güneş (Captive Sun)* and *Yarın Yok (No Tomorrow)*. Fiction does not tie writers' hands with the facts of history or actuality like in biographies but lets us free to fly with wings of imagination.

# What advice would you give aspiring writers about finding their unique voice?

Every writer is her/his own creator. I do not find myself fit to give advice to my future colleagues because each of us with our different cultural backgrounds have a sound which is unique to us and we must be free to choose our own path. No advice needed for the urge to write, it springs from talent blessed to us yet we must perfect it with reading classics and other's works constantly.

# What do you read for inspiration, and who are some authors you admire?

I try to follow young writers works but always go back to nostalgic Russian novels which I never tire from reading, and English literature has always been my favorite.

### How did your experience at ACG influence you as a writer?

As an answer to this question let me just give a few names from my school term and say no more: Pınar Kür, Nazlı Eray, Tomris Gedik (Uyar), İpek Ongun, Dikmen Gürün, Mualla Mezhepoğlu, Leyla Batu Pekcan. ACG was an ocean for those who had talents specially for acting or writing. I am one of the lucky fish in that ocean.

### Cevat Çapan RC 53 Discovered the Power of Poetry Early

I "My first volume of poetry was published in 1985 when I was 52."

Cevat Çapan has dedicated his life to poetry and theater, as a writer, translator, and academic.

How did you discover poetry? How did your poetic path shape itself? When we feel like Wordsworth that "The world is too much with us," with wars, genocides, and other atrocities, we cannot help but ask ourselves:


How with this rage shall beauty hold a plea Whose action is no stronger than a flower?

This is followed by other questions: "What is the secret of this flower? And how strong is beauty? Do we believe like Keats that

"Beauty is truth, truth beauty that is all Ye you know on earth, and all ye need to know"?

When I read Yeats' "Easter 1916" which announces that "A terrible beauty is born" because of the Dublin uprising, I discovered the secret and power of poetic beauty.

My style of storytelling was shaped by the folk tales I read at an early age. I was introduced to poems by Wordsworth and Robert Browning at RC and by graduation was familiar with almost all the great poets of world

literature. During these last years I had already published poems in the school review İzlerimiz and other literary reviews like Varlık. In Cambridge where I was studying English Literature, I was intimidated to publish anything for a long time. After working in the Turkish Section of BBC for a year, I returned to Türkiye and translated poetry rather than publishing my own stuff. My first volume of poetry was published in 1985, when I was 52.

This book was followed by other slim volumes and a selection from these were translated into English by Michael Hulse and myself under the title Where Are You, Susie Petchek?

(Arc Publications). My friend from Cambridge, A. S. Byatt wrote in her introduction to this collection that my poems were, "in many ways paradoxical. They sound ancient and traditional, and yet they are recognizably related to modernism. Çapan is a man obsessed by poetry, by literature, who has made his life from it, translating poets and playwrights from many languages, across many languages, and yet his voice is his own and not 'literary."

### What guides you in your translations?

I have tried to follow Samuel Johnson's advice:

"Let observation with extensive view Survey mankind from China to Peru."

Collaborating with other translators I published seven volumes of world poetry under the title *Şiir Atlası* as well as other collections of individual poets.

### How about your involvement with theater?

I have been passionately interested to see most of the plays produced in Istanbul, Ankara, and if I had the opportunity, in London and Paris. Although I have taught history of drama in several universities and conservatoires, I regret that I have not been more active as a director of plays or a professional drama critic.

### Pınar Kür RC YÜK 63 Questions Literature's Role Today

I "I learned how to write by reading Tolstoy."

Author and dramatist Pınar Kür has penned such seminal works as Bir Deli Ağaç (A Tree Deranged), Küçük Oyuncu (Little Player), Bir Cinayet Romanı (A Murder Novel) and Asılacak Kadın (Woman to be Hanged).

What is the most vital role literature plays in society today? I don't think literature plays a vital role in today's society. There were times literature was the most important for information, pleasure, everything that made people happy or unhappy. But now because technology is so advanced, practically nobody reads books and I suppose the books they do read don't really touch them. For

me it's vital because I write, but for the reader I don't think it's vital.

### How did you start writing detective stories?

I always liked reading detective stories from an early age. I was tried for ruining the youth of Türkiye. I went to court many times. It gave me an idea: "Why don't I write a detective story myself?" They are not the usual type of detective stories - there's a murder, different mysterious things going on but they are not like the usual books. More like searching for truth in life through searching for the murderer. The form is a detective story, but with another purpose, of how a work of fiction progresses.

# How do you develop your characters? Do they ever surprise you as you write?

I develop the form and the characters before I sit down to write the book. Once I plan the text and the characters, I usually try to find faces for my characters from people I know. They do sometimes surprise me or even though I plan the thing, along the way sometimes I get stuck. Usually, I know who is who and what is what before I write the book.

#### What drew you to translating?

Money! When I graduated from RC I wanted to go to Paris. I needed money. So I started to translate. I tried to work on books I liked, but sometimes I took whatever I got.

# What do you read for inspiration, and who are some authors you admire?

I used to say I learned how to write by reading Tolstoy. I have many favorites. My thesis at the Sorbonne was on Pirandello and O'Neill. I also like drama very much. I prefer reading drama.

### How did your experience at Robert College shape you as an author?

It didn't really because I didn't spend a lot of time at RC; I came from the US to RC as a transfer student. The school was very good. I liked the school, sitting under the trees and looking at the sea. It was easy for me. If I had done all my education in the US and came back to a Turkish university, I would have had difficulty but because I had been educated outside of Türkiye, it was not difficult to adapt to RC.

### Nazlı Eray ACG 62 Feels Writing Gives Her Freedom

I "Writing is pure spirit, a tempest, a tornado, a wail, a volcano erupting."

Nazlı Eray is one of the most prolific authors in contemporary Turkish fiction.

# You use magical realism in your writing. What appeal did this approach have for you?

I have been writing stories in the magical realism style since forever. The very first one was *Monsieur Hristo*, which I wrote when I was 16. It made me famous overnight. I did not know what magical realism was. Indeed, that phrase had not even been coined. No Marquez, no Lord of the Rings, no Harry Potter, no cellphones, no credit cards. The world was small and clean. It was small yet big.

It is as if I look at the world through a crystal prism. I see the world in a unique way which has not changed. I have written about a hundred books, which have been translated all over the world. I was born a writer, and I could not have done anything else. I was an emotional rebel and a vagabond. I went to Ankara one day. Instead of staying for a week, I stayed for 35 years. I was writing all the time, trying to figure out life. Time and death. Dreams and reality. These were my subjects.

#### What is literature's role in life?

I don't think in terms of literature, I think in terms of life. You need to read to recognize life, to understand it and be aware of it. If you are aware, you live a long life. If not, the train just runs on.

Writing gives me freedom. I set my own rules and build an alternate world. I write for many generations. Children,

youth, middle aged, elderly - they all find something in my books.

# What is your advice to budding writers and literature enthusiasts? To believe in themselves. They should write as if they are the first in the world to do so. Against all rules, in whichever way they want. Only then will they feel free. But of course, they need to read a lot; Russian, Japanese and

### Who are your favorite authors and books?

French literature.

I love Dostoevsky and Gogol. I love Miyazaki films and anime. Dick Bakken and Kazuko Shiraishi; I attended the Iowa Writers' Workshop with them. Gabriel Garcia Marquez. When he won the Nobel prize, everyone understood what magical realism was. Me - I had been writing in the magical realism style since the 1960s. Jean-Christophe Grangé: I met him in Paris when I accidentally spilled wine on his copy of his latest novel. I don't believe writing can be taught in workshops. You don't learn how to write in workshops, you learn how to edit. Writing is pure spirit, a tempest, a tornado, a wail, a volcano erupting.

### How did your experience at ACG contribute to your literary path?

It pointed me in the right direction. I was taught about freedom, and I was a stellar student.

### ipek Ongun ACG 61 Pioneered the Young Adult Category in Literature

I "Not being didactic is crucial."

ipek Ongun virtually single-handedly created the young adult category in Turkish literature and impacted the sensibilities of many generations through her numerous novels.

How did you decide to write for young adults?

I decided to write for young adults after realizing that there were no books in Türkiye specifically written for them. The year was 1980. There were just two categories; books for adults and books for children - nothing in between. So I told my editor that I wanted to write for teenagers, that it is a very important period in one's life and writing novels which would help them understand their feelings, their ups and downs and what to do about all these would make a big

difference. My editor was convinced but the owners of the publishing house weren't, saying, there were only two categories in the publishing world. My book didn't fit in – period.

If my editor believed in something, she would try her best to realize it. In the end, after two years, publishers decided to put my first teenage book, Yaş 17 (Age 17), in a category that covered all sorts of books like travel and health, with no advertising! I really had no hope. But somehow several young people got hold of my book, and by word of mouth the book was selling, really selling!

The publishers were very much surprised. After that, all opposition stopped.

I wrote a thirteen-book series named Bir Genç Kızın Gizli Defteri (Secret Diary of a Young Girl). Each book of the series dealt with a different critical issue.

How does the feedback you receive from your readers influence your writing?

I receive thousands of letters from my readers. They write about their problems, they share their happiness or things that make them sad. They have questions about life, love, friends, decisions. All these lead me to read and learn about these issues. Before I start writing a new book, I spend a long time on reading about the subject that I am going to write. I read books written by authors who are authorities on the subject. In other words, I do my "homework". Then I convey all these in a very simple language. Definitely not in a didactic manner! Like two friends talking.

They'll be reading and enjoying but behind all that they will be getting the message that would be useful for them!

What do you like to read?

I love reading about history and biographies. Classics I have read in my younger years.

How did your experience at ACG influence your path as an author? ACG was a wonderful school. It brings out the best in you. We had music, literature, drama, folklore in addition to all the basic courses. I was a member of a literature club, our president was Ülkü Tamer. Tomris Uyar and Ayşe Kulin were my classmates.

### Ömer Koç RC 80 Finds Literature Therapeutic

I "Literature is timeless in its ability to convey universal truths and experiences."

Chairman of Koç Holding and avid art and book collector Ömer Koç contributes to Turkish intellectual life in all of these capacities. A recent example is the riveting exhibition at Meşher, The Story Unfolds in Istanbul, centered around 300 books from the Ömer Koç Collection and summoning different representations of Istanbul over time.

### What makes literature timeless and worth preserving?

Good literature is an antidote to the horrors of existence and everyday problems. Just like art, it makes the ride easier. It is extremely therapeutic.

### How do you decide which books to add to your collection?

First of all, if it is a title in my area of interest which I do not have, I most definitely try to acquire it. Also, I upgrade constantly. If I happen upon a better copy of a book that I already have (it could be an association and/or presentation copy or in an armorial binding), I add it to the collection with alacrity.

I used to get rid of the inferior copy but for many years now, I am reluctant to part with it and I normally keep it as a reading copy.

# Were there any surprising discoveries while preparing for the exhibition?

Once we decided to hold such an exhibition, I started acquiring more and more books set in Istanbul. And yes, there were some unexpected discoveries as a good number of these novels have minor but interesting details.

# What message or experience do you hope visitors take away from this showcase?

That the Queen of Cities, the city at the thwarted kiss of two continents is a fabulous city which has fascinated so many diverse writers and literary personalities.

### Which literary works have had the greatest influence on you personally and on society as a whole?

As much as I love history, like Disraeli, I think that "A first-rate work of fiction is the greatest stretch of the intellect!" In my youth, I was very

much influenced and seduced by Pierre Loti's books set in Istanbul. Now he is considered an outmoded author with too flowery a style. But I really think he got Istanbul and understood the Turkish soul which makes him very dear to my heart. Another book which I love is Claude Farrere's L'Homme Qui Assassina (The Man Who Murdered) and Thomas Hope's Anastasius, Memoirs of a Greek is my favorite novel set in the East. It is a psychologically penetrating novel and also extremely funny. Byron is said to have wept twice upon reading it. Once because he had not written *Anastasius*. and again because Hope had.

# Jale Parla ACG 64 Highlights How Literature Invites Us to Contemplate the Human Condition

I "Literature is the artistic medium that is closest to philosophy."

An esteemed comparative literature professor and literary critic, Jale Parla considers herself a historian of literature.

#### What is the role of literature?

The vital role of literature is to heighten awareness of everything that surrounds the individual. Literature provides one with an experience that no other artistic medium does: It offers the chance to contemplate the human condition, partake in the experiences of other lives, penetrate into the multifarious aspects of experiential reality.

In our digital age of fast appropriation and consumption of facts, events, and relations, reading provides the chance to dwell on other lives; evaluate encounters and experiences

in a broader temporal space that covers the past as well as the present. Literature is the artistic medium that is closest to philosophy, the discipline of methodological investigation and evaluation that unfortunately no longer gets the attention that it deserves.

### Parla recalls her RC years in an interview she gave at Bilgi University:

There were wonderful professors at the RC Comparative Literature Department. They all had their PhDs from Harvard, Yale, Oxford; Hillary Sumner Boyd, David Garwood and Keith M. Greenwood. They did not teach us a methodology of how to compare literature. All they wanted was for us to read literature across borders- which is the main tenet of comparative literature. I only realized that comparative literature was a methodology, indeed a questionable methodology, at Harvard.

# Maureen Freely ACG 71 Starts by Understanding the Author's Motives

I "My favorite book to translate was *Dawn* by Sevgi Soysal."

Novelist, professor, and translator Maureen Freely is well-known for translating Orhan Pamuk's work into English.

### How do you stay faithful to the original text in a different language?

It's not so much a question of staying faithful to a text so much as trying to understand what the author is striving to do in that text. My first question is: what are they trying to do here? What literary devices are they using to produce the thoughts, images and responses I am feeling so powerfully? And (most importantly) what can I do to recreate the music of the Turkish in English? Questions around accuracy are of course important, but best left to the next stage.

### What was your favorite book to translate? The most difficult?

My favorite is *Dawn* (*Şafak*) by Sevgi Soysal. The most difficult was *The Museum of Innocence* (*Masumiyet Müzesi*) because Orhan Pamuk and I fell out when I was about half-way through. But never did I lose my faith in the book itself. I think we can both be proud of that translation.

### What advice would you give about becoming a literary translator?

Start with a summer school. Another good idea is to enroll in a creative writing program. Much of what you need to know as a translator, you will learn by doing your own writing.

### How did your experience at ACG influence you?

I could go on and on about the quality of the education I received there but let me just say that it was by listening to my classmates breaking the "English Only" rule that I began to learn Turkish.

### Forever Recommendation from Oya Kaynar Başak ACG 55: Shakespeare

I "Shakespeare is a funny man!"

The RCQ spoke with Başak, an Emeritus Professor of Western Languages and Literature at Boğaziçi University, right before her passing (see p. 72). She underlined how eyeopening literature is.

### What is the most vital role literature plays in society?

Literature guides us. It creates new, colorful, and comprehensive situations that have a lot of meaning and interest. It opens people's eyes. Literature is encouraging. It carries our hopes for the future.

### How has young people's interest in literature changed over time?

Classic literature used to be central in schools, but now there's more emphasis on diverse and contemporary voices. The rise of short-form content such as TikTok has impacted how young

people engage with literature. On the bright side, Shakespeare's works have been adapted into countless movies, and many of them make his stories more accessible and enjoyable for modern audiences. Whether they stick to the original text or take creative liberties, films such as the Baz Luhrman's *Romeo + Juliet* or Kenneth Branagh's *Hamlet* capture the very essence of Shakespeare. I hope young people still take advantage of movies.

### What are the books you would never tire of re-reading?

Hamlet, Hamlet, Hamlet! The work of an incredible genius. The richness of his vocabulary. The vision he presents to us of possibilities. His identification with the characters he creates and their amazing variety and range. It's an unbelievable, unending surprise, and yes, it is fun! That's another thing, Shakespeare is a funny man. He knows he enjoys life, and he makes us enjoy life. To steal from the song, "Amazing Grace," Shakespeare has amazing grace and power with language.

### Gündüz Vassaf RA 64 Believes We Are All Creators

I "The creative process is a liberation from all labels and categories, even ourselves."

Writer and psychologist Gündüz Vassaf has produced novels, essays and memoirs, alongside his academic work. He is renowned for his thought-provoking perspectives.

What is literature's role in challenging societal structures and encouraging critical thinking? Rabelais turned social mores of the 16th century upside down; Eric Maria Remarque's All Quiet On The Western Front critically challenged the war rhetoric of the nation state and Rachel Carson's Silent Spring was a harbinger of our ecological consciousness. However, literature on the whole has promoted the opposite of critical thinking as evidenced by fundamental religious texts at one end and the escapist best-selling novels of today's consumerist society.

Your works often bridge literature, psychology, and philosophy. How do they intersect in your creative process?

We're all at our best when we embrace spontaneity that allows our work to be interpreted in many ways. At the end, we're all creators. As children, we sing, dance, draw and tell stories only to lose it all when art becomes segregated from what is said to be real life. The creative process is a liberation from all labels and categories, even ourselves.

What advice would you give to young writers who are trying to find their voice in a rapidly changing world?

Be the change with Nâzım Hikmet's words, "The most beautiful words I wanted to tell you I haven't said yet."


### Hikmet Hükümenoğlu RC 89 Recommends Reading for Writing

I "We value literature because it helps us to understand ourselves and the world we live in."

A stronghold in contemporary Turkish fiction, Hükümenoğlu recently published his first detective novel Sonra Gözler Görür (Afterwards the Eyes See, Can Yayınları). The protagonist in the novel, a detective, is Hükümenoğlu's nod to old media, which he misses: "I am tired of logging into X (or whatever it's called these days) just to stay up to date on the news." Hükümenoğlu prefers "old school" face-to-face communication with his readers as well.

# Why do you think literature continues to be a relevant medium in the age of technology and instant communication?

Because we still enjoy stories, longform stories that is, not 30 second social media snippets. We enjoy getting lost between the pages of a good book. We value literature because it helps us to understand ourselves and the world we live in.

### How do you manage the balance between writing prolifically and maintaining quality?

Over the years I learned not to get too attached to my own sentences. If I don't find them acceptable they go to the bin. I'm my harshest critic.

# What advice would you give aspiring writers about finding their unique voice?

It will sound counterintuitive but I would recommend that they read prolifically, learn to differentiate voices, and practice writing as much as possible.

### You also have your own newsletter. How is that a creative outlet for you?

I used to write a blog. However, I don't have the time to maintain that commitment anymore, so I've transitioned to writing a monthly newsletter. I relish the opportunity to vent like a grumpy old man.

### Efe Murat Balıkçıoğlu RC 06 Links Poetry to Self-Expression

"In a world where algorithms and artificial intelligence can replicate prose and convey information, poetry may become our primary tool for personal expression."

Efe Murat Balıkçıoğlu (nom de plume Efe Murad) is a faculty fellow in Islamic history at NYU, as well as a poet and translator.

### Why do you think poetry remains relevant today?

Poetry has always been meant to be spoken aloud, though it's often preserved in writing. In today's world, where attention spans are shrinking and visual distractions are constant, the written word can sometimes seem less relevant. Even novels have become shorter and more concise. As Italo Calvino noted in Six Memos for the Next Millennium, quickness has become one of the central mantras of the modern

age—and this might, in turn, revitalize poetry's role in self-expression.

### How was your translation of Ezra Pound received?

The critical reception has been positive. My name gained recognition; the book sold well. I forged some wonderful friendships along the way such as Kemal Noyan RA 61. In 2020, the director Deniz Tortum RC 08 visited me, and I read aloud to him Pound's "Hell Cantos" (Cantos XIV-XV). Deniz suggested a live reading of the entire book through Instagram. During the reading, certain phrases from the poem went viral on social media.

### How did your experience at RC influence your path as a writer?

It was incredibly formative. The academic rigor, combined with the vibrant exchange of ideas, instilled in me a deep passion for learning and a commitment to the power of self-expression.

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# Gökçe Güven RC 18 Helps Businesses Increase **Customer Loyalty**

The Kalder founder shares details about her journey and advice for aspiring entrepreneurs.

When RCQ interviewed Gökçe Güven in 2022 (see RCQ 60, p. 25), it was clear that she was going places with her company Kalder. Kalder helps businesses strengthen their customer relationships through white label rewards programs that tap into a network of brands for partner rewards. In just over two years, Kalder is backed by \$11 million in funding at a \$35 million valuation. Güven was recently recognized for her achievements by making it on Forbes's 30 Under 30 list.

RC truly shaped Güven's journey: "Social Entrepreneurship with Aybike Oğuz was life changing. Inspired by that class and as a soccer player on the RC Bobcats, I co-founded Girls on the Field Academy with Melis Abacıoğlu. I interned at Ashoka Foundation, followed Aybike Oğuz to events like Impact Imece, and immersed myself in social entrepreneurship. Mr. Carter's business classes taught me the fundamentals. My programming class showed me how technology can build the future. Debate Society honed my storytelling skillsessential for founders. Mr. Hoovler's Modern Novel class taught me to think radically. He'd say, "If you don't present a radical idea, you'll get a 50." That shaped my belief that entrepreneurs must be bold and unconventional, and fiction is the best source of inspiration to go out of the box. Everything I needed to become a founder, I found at RC."

Before Kalder, Güven worked at fintech companies like Robinhood and Celo, where she saw firsthand how rewards and wallet ecosystems operate: "I realized that giants were



turning their rewards programs into fintechs and asked, 'Why can't every brand do this?" From that question, it took a lot of work to create Kalder's success: "The journey from pre-seed to today has been about staying close to early customers for feedback, iterating ruthlessly, staying true to the problem space and learning from failures."

She has two pieces of advice for budding entrepreneurs in the RC community:

1. Always have a hypothesis—in life, career, or personal goals. Strong hypotheses are valuable because they're either right or wrong. If you're right, double down; if you're wrong, iterate and improve. Don't operate without a hypothesis because then you don't know what you like or not always have a goal or purpose.

2. Choose your category and join the best companies in that space. For example, if you want to be in fintech, identify the type of fintech that excites you, join the best Series A or B companies in that space. Work way more than expected, get close to the founders and best team members and get the projects that matter. This exposure will teach you what it takes to build a startup and you will naturally find an unaddressed problem within that space instead of trying to find a problem to solve in a vacuum. I came up with the first ideas of Kalder in Robinhood and took years to build hypotheses. Keep your eyes open to problems and people you are excited about on the way. I keep a list of the best people I want to work with and problems I am excited to solve in my notes app.

# Hayal Pozanti RC 00 Collaborates With Fashion House Dior

The contemporary artist designed three unique handbags featuring her signature hieroglyphic elements for the Lady Dior Art Project.

### Contemporary artist

Hayal Pozanti continues to garner recognition for her work, and fashion house Dior took notice. For its iconic Lady Dior handbag, Dior has run a program called the Lady Dior Art Project since 2016. Each year a select group of international artists are invited to use the bag as their canvas, and this year Pozanti was one of them.

Known for her conceptual and emotional work, Pozanti designed three bags. One of them is a clutch featuring a nocturnal panorama, and the interior is covered with mirrors, offering a reading of oneself and the world. The other two are inspired by one of Pozanti's passions, trekking. The iconic "D, I, O, R" charms are reinvented in a hieroglyphic alphabet



conceived by the artist. Indeed, Pozanti's work often considers and plays with language. One such work is permanently installed in the New York Public Library (see RCQ 59, p. 16).

After RC, Pozantı studied at Sabancı University and subsequently worked in Türkiye for five years. When she arrived at the Yale School of Art as a graduate student, she had been feeling bombarded by the online world. She weaned herself off the internet and vowed to make something by hand. Pozanti went onto create a visual language of her own called Instant Paradise, with hieroglyphiclike characters which correspond to numbers and letters in the English alphabet. From more abstract shapes, her work has now moved on to encompass color and movement, something she attributes to moving to Vermont and hiking in nature.

## Work of Ömer Uluç RC ENG 53 Featured in Solo Exhibition

I The exhibition showcases pieces from 50 years of his career.

Fifteen years after he passed away, painter Ömer Uluç's work is celebrated with a solo exhibition at Istanbul Modern - Beyond the Horizon. The exhibition brings together various forms of expression that are key in the artist's practice and features a comprehensive selection of works from the 1960s to 2010.

Uluç's interest in art started during his RC days when he took lessons from painter Nuri İyem. He later studied engineering in the US. The years 1975-77 took Uluç to West Africa where he worked and did research. Between 1978-1980 he served as the art consultant of the Istanbul Atatürk Cultural Center. From 1983 onwards, he lived in Paris but spent a considerable part of each year in Istanbul. He held many exhibitions at numerous galleries and museums across the world. His medium was not just painting and he experimented with a variety of different materials.

In his book of monologues Heves Kuşu Durmaz Döner (The Bird of Enthusiasm Does Not Stop, It Turns) Uluç wrote: "Us artists should know alongside Stephen Hawking that, 'We live in a star galaxy that stretches a thousand light years from one end to the other and turns slowly; stars in its spiral arms only rotate around the core of the galaxy once every few hundred million years. Our sun

is a medium-sized, yellow star close to the interior edge of one of those spiral arms.' Isn't that a sufficient explanation to make art?"

# Kenan Şahin RA 60 Shares Business Wisdom for Start-ups in New Books

I Şahin predicts a burst in start-ups thanks to AI.



Entrepreneur, scientist, inventor, academic and philanthropist Kenan Şahin shares the wisdom he has garnered from his entrepreneurial journey with two books: Lean Startup to Lean Company to Rich Exit and Lean

Startup to Lean Company to Rich Exit: The Guidebook (Forbes Books).

Şahin explains that Lean Startup to Lean Company to Rich Exit is the story of his company: "It reports on the twists and turns of taking a startup from 'me, me, and me' with \$1,000 capital, to 1,000 staff in 12 offices across six countries. Along the way it gained giant telecom companies as its clients and eventually exited via Lucent/Bell Labs, the largest telecom company at the time, with Bell Labs being the storied R&D center and the envy of the world."

Having been an academic for nearly two decades, Şahin felt compelled to follow up this book with the equivalent of a textbook, hence the guidebook: "The far greater motivation for this second book was to alert startups about the hazards of the journey and give them a practical road map that covered almost all aspects of a growing firm: guiding values, culture, marketing, selling, hiring, accounting, branching and legal. I wanted it to come out immediately, anticipating that startups would skyrocket because of the lure of AI, and the new generation of AI that would make startups so much easier to launch."

The books are complementary. Şahin is now sending the two-volume set to academics who teach entrepreneurship "so the messages can be conveyed through them more effectively to the students who are contemplating entrepreneurship via startups."

# Dilek Ataman Bağdatlıoğlu RC 76 Offers Corporations a Practical Guide for Sustainability

The book demonstrates how companies and banks can adopt environmental, social and governance goals.

Sustainability consultant Dilek Bağdatlıoğlu has authored a book, Cevresel, Sosyal ve Yönetişim Hedeflerini Dengelemek; Bankalar ve Şirketler ÇSY ve Sürdürülebilirlik Konusunda Ne Yapabilirler? (Balancing Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) Goals; What Can Banks and Companies Do Regarding ESG and Sustainability?; Akıl Fikir Yayınları), about the need of working to solve ESG issues in all countries around the world, including Türkiye.

Dr. Bağdatlıoğlu's book is a practical guide to companies; it describes which action is needed on each of the main components of ESG, making it easier for companies and banks to plan, implement and report on these goals,



and aims to help companies and banks to accelerate their ESG efforts. It demonstrates that it is in the interest of companies and banks to have ESG goals and pursue them.

Bağdatlıoğlu believes Turkish companies are progressing in adopting ESG goals, especially among larger corporations, though there is still some way to go: "A recent survey we conducted found that 335 companies among the largest 500 in Türkiye do not report on ESG. Moreover, the quality of the ESG reports is uneven among those who do report. With growing international pressure, regulatory reforms, and an increasing focus on sustainability among the Turkish public, Turkish firms can close the gap in the coming years, particularly in areas like renewable energy and governance."

Bağdatlıoğlu remembers RC as a source of inspiration: "RC's education encourages engagement in community affairs and an openness to the latest developments in scientific and social issues. I had actually already been active in the social aspects of ESG for many years."

# Seda Aksoy Evren RC 95 Explores Time Travel in New Book

I The book is her way of saying "thank you" for her childhood.



The author of Kirmizi Balon Uçuyor (Red Balloon is Flying, Uçan Fil Yayınları) and Annem de Çocukmuş (My Mom Too Was Once a Child, Masalperest Yayınları) has a new book out. Seda Aksoy Evren's latest, Zaman Yolcusu Kalmasın (Last Call For Time Travelers, Masalperest Yayınları), asks if time travel is possible, and, if so, how would the expectations of a child differ from those of an adult.

Aksoy Evren's own memories inspired the book: "My family and all the childhood memories related to them have always been very precious. I have a strong belief that these memories can always stay alive with a small remembrance of those special moments. This is the main reason why I have written *Zaman Yolcusu Kalmasın*. A special 'thank you' note for the great times." Indeed, her father was a collector of photograph machines and video cameras, and, thanks to his interest, she still has access to recordings of a lot of happy moments.

Aksoy Evren maintains that writing for children can give a great freedom and opportunity for the people who like to imagine. "The world of picture books makes me happy," she says.

# Zeynep Pekün Ekşioğlu RC 90 Writes Cookbook With a Novel Focus

The book of recipes highlights Türkiye's biodiversity.

After nearly two decades in fashion retail, Zeynep Pekün Ekşioğlu has a new passion for cooking. She attended culinary school at the age of 40 and obtained her chef certificate. She soon discovered that she gravitated towards plant-based cuisine. This journey culminated in publishing a book of recipes that she put together over the course of six years under her brand Lokal Plants. The name of the book is *ici* Güzel (Beautiful on the Inside, Ofset Yapımevi) and it is mostly comprised of drinks: healthy beverages, plant mylks, smoothies, mylkshakes, green juices, and soups.



Ekşioğlu elaborates: "My book was shaped by my passion for local and clean produce. Unlike a traditional cookbook, it focuses not only on recipes, but also on the source of ingredients, the farmers who plant and harvest them, and the value of clean soil. All the ingredients in this book are from Türkiye without exception. My reason for doing so was to show the biodiversity of our fertile land and how it is possible to source clean plants and fruits from small growers. Weaving the stories of these farmers who toil with an undeniable optimism together with my own fascination with plants, I hoped to bring the reader a modern look at what we put on the table, where it comes from and how we all can integrate into nature as a whole, philosophically."

# Buğra Giritlioğlu RC 89 Creates an Anthology of Contemporary Turkish Poetry

I Giritlioğlu dedicates the book to his Prep English teachers and RC 89 classmates.

Writer Buğra Giritlioğlu helps Turkish contemporary poetry reach new audiences with his anthology *The Pulse of Contemporary Turkish - Poems from the New Millennium* (Syracuse University Press). The anthology combines established voices and emerging poets.

Though difficult, he and his cotranslator friend Daniel Scher were inspired: "We had early successes, publishing some of our translations in various journals. That only whetted our appetites. We wanted to do more—either by translating additional work by the same poets or expanding our reach to touch more lives. The latter felt more exciting and meant focusing on living poets. I consulted the few

poets I knew, who then recommended their peers. Over time, my list grew from a handful of names to sixty-one poets. Within a few years, I had pored over 167 books and translated 215 poems. Of those, I have selected 172 for this volume."

Giritlioğlu chose poems that reflect on universal themes like life, death, love, time, and nature: "Poetry is where we seek companionship and answers to ease our existential pain. Translating poetry presents many challenges associated with enjambment, wordplay, rhyme, rhythm, alliteration, and tone, but poems often offer ways to recreate the poet's intended effect, if not in the same spot, then elsewhere. I hope readers find as much pleasure



in these poems—whether lyrical, experimental, abstract, or concrete—as I have." Giritlioğlu dedicated the book to the late Chilton Watrous and his beloved Phillip Esposito, as well as his RC 89 classmates.

# Sanem Cerit RC 17 Tells the Story of a Young Cancer Patient

I Her first book uses a unique approach to capture Ali's story.



The joy and energy of a young girl named Ela, despite her struggles, left a lasting impact on Sanem Cerit when she met her at a cancer clinic. The encounter caused Cerit to rethink her plans and priorities.

Several years later, Cerit met Ali, a 17-year old cancer patient, during her onco-psychology internship, and the book *A Pinch of Awareness* was the result of Cerit's subsequent internship with PhotovoiceWorldwide. Using Photovoice (a visual participatory method), Ali captured his life, perspective and experiences after his diagnosis, during treatment and beyond.

Cerit sees the writing of the book as a long journey that started with the hope of sharing the voice of a cancer patient and highlighting the importance of listening rather than making assumptions about others' experiences. Using Cerit's questions as prompts, Ali photographed scenes and objects that hold meaning for him and recorded the feelings and thoughts they evoke.

Cerit believes A Pinch of Awareness conveys a powerful message about giving cancer patients the opportunity to speak their truth behind the diagnosis. It's a hopeful and engaging story that can help break the stigma around cancer by encouraging clinicians and others to look beyond the diagnosis and truly see the person: "Whether they are patients, families, or clinicians, we want them to be reminded they're not alone. We also aim to highlight the power of truly listening, seeing beyond assumptions, and recognizing the person behind the diagnosis."

# Graves, Gatherings, and Gurbetçi Cravings: A Road Trip Through RC History

Two RC alumni traveled across the US northeast during their winter break in search of landmarks of their alma mater's history and familiar flavors from home.

It's almost been a decade since our cohort of RC 16 has flown from the nest, and the winds of serendipity have already scattered us across several continents. For those of us currently perched on the East Coast of the United States, however, this winter offered a rare occasion to catch up, with a road trip spanning a dozen states and connecting just as many hearts. Figuring we might as well hit three birds with one rented car, and inspired by our beloved teacher Önder Kaya's dedication to documenting history through gravestones, we decided to take this chance to track down the final resting places of the historical personages who shaped Robert College and the American College for Girls. And galvanized further by our stomachs, we also tried to visit authentic Turkish restaurants on

our way to determine the best spots for our fellow gurbetçi friends to cure their culinary homesickness. The result was an adventure fusing gastronomic delights and historical reflection, and a pilgrimage that put us on the trail of founders, and a pioneering educator who changed the course of women's education in Türkiye.

### **Setting Off: Durham to Baltimore**

The natural starting point for our journey was Durham, North Carolina, since our trip was inspired in part by our visits to Turkish restaurants in the region over the years. We got together there mid-December, fittingly finalizing our course over İskender kebab at Chapel Hill's Tallula's. (Please refer to the "Kebab Addendum" in the online version of this article for more information on select restaurants.) On December 17. we set out from Durham towards Baltimore. Maryland, stopping en route at Sultan Kebab in Charlottesville, Virginia, where the hearty portions and the warmth of the owners boosted our spirits for the long journey ahead. We reached Baltimore that evening to stay with our friend Beril Erdoğdu RC 16 for several days, exploring the city and Washington, DC, before heading towards NYC.

### **Onward to New York: Christopher Robert**

On December 22, we reached the Big Apple, where we stayed in Brooklyn at our RC 16 friend Sule Kahraman's

house for a few days and enjoyed the bustle of Manhattan in the holiday season with Beril, Can Gübür RC 16 and another friend. Velat. On December 23, we finally ventured into Brooklyn's historic Green-Wood Cemetery to visit the grave of Christopher Robert (1802-1878), the merchant-philanthropist whose generosity made our beloved institution a reality.

Robert had never intended for the college to be named after him. yet Cyrus Hamlin insisted-and so "Robert College" was born. After an hour's search in -15°C, we paid our respects under the wintry sky to the man who, despite many obstacles, championed the idea of an American institution of higher learning on the Bosphorus.

#### **Boston Bound: Cyrus Hamlin and** the Christmas Chill

departed York New December 24, arriving in Boston, Massachusetts, that evening and reuniting with two other friends, Deniz Kızıldağ RC 16 and Deniz Keles RC 16. Two days later we set out for nearby Lexington to visit the grave of Cyrus Hamlin (1811-1900) in Munroe Cemetery. Hamlin was a most fascinating figure: originally a Congregational missionary, he was known for his "jack-of-all-trades" talents-baker, engineer, teacher, and even pharmacist during the Crimean War. He was also a cousin of Hannibal Hamlin, Abraham Lincoln's first Vice President.

When RC opened in 1863, it was Hamlin's effort and energy that sustained it through its challenging early years. Building construction faced delays, funding shortfalls threatened the campus's future, and diplomacy with Ottoman officials proved grueling. Yet Hamlin's persistence laid the foundation for what would become the oldest American college outside the United States.

### **Visiting Canterbury: Mary Mills Patrick**

That same day, we pressed on to Canterbury—a village in rural New Hampshire-to locate the grave of Mary Mills Patrick (1850-1940). She rests in a quiet village cemetery, surrounded by little more than a small church, a general store, and snowcovered pine forests. Witnessing the modesty of her birthplace, one could forget how Patrick made her enduring mark halfway across the world in Istanbul as the president of ACG for over three decades. An intrepid scholar and educator, she oversaw the transformation of ACG from a modest high school into a world-class institution of higher learning for women.

Patrick also championed the cause of educating Ottoman women of all backgrounds, influencing and forging relationships with prominent figures such as Halide Edip Adıvar ACG 1901. After a fire ravaged ACG's old Üsküdar campus, she relentlessly raised funds to help move the college to Arnavutköy, a contribution which would turn out to be decisive for RC's own future. As we cleaned the moss and snow from Patrick's tombstone, surrounded by the tranguil atmosphere of Canterbury, we were reminded that RC might not exist today without her efforts.

#### The Journey Back: Princeton and Caleb Frank Gates

Early on December 28, we finally started the long journey back south toward Durham-stopping for dinner at Bereket Restaurant in Bridgeport, Connecticut, to reward ourselves with some İskender kebab-and at Princeton to pay our respects to Caleb Frank Gates (1857–1946). Gates's presidency began in 1903, at an extraordinarily tumultuous juncture for the Ottoman Empire. By

the time he stepped down in 1932, he had guided RC through the Balkan Wars, World War I, the collapse of the Ottoman Empire, and the early years of the modern Turkish Republic.

Gates originally came to Türkiye in 1881, teaching in Mardin and Harpoot from 1881 to 1902. His knowledge of Turkish culture and history, along with his administrative acumen proved crucial at RC: through diplomacy with both the Young Turks and later republican leaders, Gates preserved the institution's academic mission amid decades of upheaval.

#### **Crossing the Finish Line**

After spending the next two days visiting Beril and other friends in Baltimore, we arrived back in Durham at precisely 11:59 pm on December 31. We traveled hundreds of miles to place roses by gravestones and sample kebabs in cozy diners, but in each stop, we also discovered something intangible—an echo of the shared values instilled in us during our student days.

# Kemal Alp Taylan RC 04 Provides Hope to **Vulnerable Populations**

The Syrian War triggered his decision to shift from the business world to an NGO.

Kemal Alp Taylan was working in the private sector but had always been interested in the work that the United Nations and NGOs do in disaster zones. When he witnessed millions taking refuge in Türkiye during the Syrian civil war, he decided that he wanted to do something more meaningful with his life and in 2017 he joined Save the Children to help refugees.

His first task was designing and implementing trainings for refugee and host community youth in the province of Hatay, his family's hometown, to improve their employability and business skills: "My background in the private sector helped me to advance this project by aligning the training content with the market needs and using my business connections."

Currently, Taylan is part of Save the Children's Global Humanitarian Education Team: "I focus on improving emergency preparedness of our different country teams to optimize our emergency response time to ensure children in crises zones are protected and return to learning soon as possible. Previously, I worked as a coordinator within UN's Cluster (Emergency) Coordination mechanism in contexts including South Sudan, Syria, Ethiopia and Türkiye, among others."

Taylan felt empowered by the spirit of RC in his move to an NGO: "In addition to gaining a strong educational



foundation, my time at RC helped me to be an independent thinker and not to be afraid to try and find out what I really want to do in my life, and once found, pursuing that passion."

# Another Home, Another Country: Baldwin in Istanbul

I James Baldwin's decade in Istanbul was shaped by the Robert College community.

When James Baldwin

first arrived in Istanbul in October 1961, he was searching for something he could not seem to find anywhere else: space to breathe and think freely. His journey had already taken him to many places around the world, yet he still felt unmoored, pursued by the racial storms of the United States and haunted by a novel that refused completion. In Istanbul, he hoped for a different rhythm, one that might release him from distraction and disillusionment. Tellingly, Baldwin would remark, years later, that Türkiye saved his life.

Baldwin's arrival to Istanbul came at a low point in his fortunes. By late 1961, he was physically exhausted, emotionally raw, and financially broke. But he had an open invitation from the Turkish actor Engin Cezzar RC 55, who, several years earlier, had appeared in a workshop production of Giovanni's Room at the Actors Studio in New York. Baldwin had cast

him as Giovanni, and the two became fast friends.

For nearly a decade, Istanbul provided him with what he needed most: a sanctuary, a dynamic community tied to RC, and the perspective he needed to see both himself and his homeland with new clarity. It offered him a measure of anonymity and peace unavailable in the United States and France, where he was increasingly recognized as a famous author and, more reluctantly, an unofficial spokesman for civil rights. In the close orbit of RC alumni, faculty, and students, he discovered both solace and stimulating conversation. Here, in Türkiye, he was simply "Jimmy."

One of the crucial people who soon entered Baldwin's life during his first Istanbul visit was David Leeming, then a young English instructor at RC who would later become Baldwin's personal assistant and definitive biographer. Baldwin was staying with Cezzar's sister, Mine, and her husband, Cevat Capan RC 53, while Cezzar was doing his mandatory military service. One evening, the Çapans invited Leeming, along with many other RC friends, to meet When Leeming arrived, "Jimmy." Baldwin was perched on a kitchen stool, scribbling on a yellow notepad. Suddenly, Baldwin stopped and stared at the page. "God," he said, "it's finished." He had just written the final lines of Another Country and dated it "Istanbul, Dec. 10, 1961."

Another member of the RC world who would later on become an important figure in Baldwin's life was Sedat Pakay RA 64, whose camera became a key witness to Baldwin's Istanbul sojourn (see RCQ 63, p. 51). Pakay's short documentary James Baldwin: From Another Place offers a rare and striking glimpse into Jimmy's Turkish decade.

Baldwin soon formed bonds with Turkish intellectuals and artists outside RC. Among these were painter Aliye Berger, as well as novelist Yasar Kemal and his wife, Tilda. Journalist and theater-critic Zeynep Oral also engaged him in thoughtful exchanges on politics, race, art, and love, and later worked as his assistant in 1969 and 1970.

Baldwin's time in Istanbul was further shaped by his friendships with humanities professor Hilary Sumner-Boyd and physicist-historian John Freely. He also met local theater personalities such as Ali Poyrazoğlu, and in 1969 and 1970 joined Sururi and Cezzar's theater endeavors. He crossed paths with African-American





singer Bertice Reading and novelistessayist Geoffrey Wolff. Through these relationships, Baldwin found not only intellectual companionship but also a broadening perspective on art, politics, and community.

During his years in the city, Baldwin welcomed visits from his brother, David, and his longtime mentor, Beauford Delaney. He also hosted international figures such as Hollywood icon Marlon Brando and writer Alex Haley in Istanbul.

The city's vibrant spirit and rich cultural life resonated deeply with Baldwin. He moved through its streets with ease, thumbing through old books in the Grand Bazaar, lingering in teahouses, and crossing the Bosphorus by ferry as the sun set behind minarets. On more than one occasion, people mistook him for Brazilian soccer player Pelé—an error that amused Baldwin, while reminding him how freely he could exist here, unburdened by fame or expectation.

Though hostility was not entirely absent in Türkiye, Baldwin found it far less frequent than in many parts of America. Far more often, he encountered curiosity, hospitality, and kindness. Crucially, he could

escape the spotlight that dogged him in the United States. In interviews with local journalists, he steered conversation toward conscience, freedom, and art rather than racial tension—though he never stopped worrying about civil rights battles at home.

During this Turkish decade—consisting of multiple visits between 1961 and 1971—Baldwin completed or refined several of his major works. He believed that recharging in Istanbul was crucial: to keep writing was, in essence, to keep fighting. The city's layered heritage, bridging continents, resonated deeply with Baldwin's sense of being an outsider who belonged to many worlds at once.

By the early 1970s, new projects and urgencies lured Baldwin elsewhere. But each time he left, he carried Istanbul with him. He never claimed to be an expatriate—his heart remained, in part, anchored in Harlem—but he made clear that the city on the Bosphorus had given him a crucial vantage point. Over a decade of sporadic residence, he had found creative renewal, lasting friendships, and an unexpected home. He even considered buying a

house in Istanbul. For RC's extended community, hosting Baldwin meant forging an extraordinary bond that bridged continents as deftly as Istanbul's own bridges span the Bosphorus.

More than fifty years have passed since Baldwin first arrived in Istanbul. Last year, the world celebrated the 100th anniversary of his birth. Yet the traces of Baldwin's presence in Istanbul remain palpable and have become part of the city lore. In photos by Pakay, we see Baldwin with a mischievous grin at a waterfront café, lost in thought under the towering minarets of the city's mosques, or tenderly touching the hand of an infant on the street. In recollections shared by Leeming, Cezzar, Pakay, Oral and many others, we glimpse a writer who arrived weary but left triumphant, buoyed by the kindness and camaraderie he found in a city that was neither entirely Western nor Eastern, but very much its own.

Istanbul gave Baldwin what he needed: a vantage "from another place," a crucial distance from America's turmoil, and the hope and warmth required to keep imagining a more compassionate and just world.

### Biga Names a Street in Honor of Mehmet R. Gürkaynak RC 59



Mehmet R. Gürkaynak was honored by his hometown Biga's Municipality by having the street on which he was born and grew up named after him. Gürkaynak graduated from Istanbul University with a major in psychology and got his PhD in social psychology in the US. After teaching in the US, he returned home to Türkiye and rose up through the ranks of academia. He founded the Gürkaynak Institute for Citizenship. He is also one of the founders of the European Conference

on Peace and Conflict Resolution-ECPCR, a founding member of ODTÜ Development Foundation, and of Umut Vakfı (Hope Foundation). Gürkaynak welcomed this honor as a gift - "a sweeping peak experience which gave me the serenity of having lived a meaningful life." Gürkaynak says: "RC gave me the strength to persist on the goals I have set for myself as well as the stubbornness to abandon those goals even when I was at the pinnacle of my comfort zone."

### A Tribute to Bebek: Muallâ Mezhepoğlu ACG 61 **Exhibits Unique Photographs**

A book and a documentary already under her belt. Muallâ Mezhepoğlu made her debut exhibition November. An architectural draftsperson and illustrator by trade, Roz Kohen has been living in the US since 1981. She obtained a master's in library science, worked in academic and public libraries as a reference librarian, cataloger and branch manager for 22 years, and retired in 2018.

Amid this industrious life, she has also been writing and illustrating bilingual short stories and memoirs in Judeo-Spanish (now considered endangered language)

English since 2000. Her book Jewish Istanbul-A Collection of Memoirs and Illustrations (Libra Yayıncılık) which focuses on the Jewish cultural experience in Istanbul in the 1950s and 1960s has garnered particular interest, and one of her reviews came from her literature teacher at ACG, Betty Kondayan: "The atmosphere of the whole book is one of love, warm family ties, happiness with small things, and face to face communication and connections."

Forward March and from then onwards the two worked closely together culminating in this exhibition where they also created two new collaborative artworks.



Now, İmalat-hane has added photographs of endangered Bursa buildings to the Istanbul series. Of course, I realize that this title can generate numerous speculations or interpretations. I prefer that spectators make their own conclusions after viewing the artwork."

## A Cultural Force: Oya Başak ACG 55

Just as this issue of the RCQ was going to press, the sad news arrived that RC Trustee Emeritus Oya Başak ACG 55 had passed away, on May 24, 2025. A steadfast supporter of RC in every sense, Başak had also contributed to this issue—fittingly, as her life was one devoted to literature and generous service (see the cover story on p. 49 and Genco Erkal's full tribute by scanning the QR code on the opposite page).



Oya Başak's journey in academia began after ACG at Mount Holyoke College, where she both studied and taught. She later earned her doctorate at the University of Minnesota, serving as a teaching assistant in the Humanities. She began teaching at RC Yüksek as early as 1968, in the period between her master's and doctoral studies making her a witness to two major transformations: the evolution of RC Yüksek into Boğaziçi University and the transition of Robert College into a coeducational high school.

When she returned to Boğaziçi University after obtaining her doctorate, she started teaching Humanities, which soon became a legendary part of the Boğaziçi experience. Her dedication and teaching finesse were lauded; she chaired the English Department

for 22 years and ultimately became a Professor Emeritus of Western Languages and Literature at Boğaziçi University, as well as a member of the Board of Trustees at Boğaziçi University Foundation.

Her connection to RC spanned decades. Başak became a Robert College Trustee in 1971, and a Trustee Emeritus in 2010. During her tenure she helped guide the school through major changes including the early years of the merger, and the closing of the Orta school. She worked with ten headmasters and participated in the selection process for many school administrators.

As a student at ACG, she was involved in theater, even acting on stage alongside Genco Erkal RC 57. This love for theater never faded, and her deep knowledge of Shakespeare became one of her hallmarks. She returned to the stage with fellow alumni actors one more time in 1991 with The Show Goes On - the opening performance for the Suna Kıraç Theater. Başak was a leading star, not only because of her performance, but also because she had secured significant funds to help build the new theater.

Indeed, Başak was far more than a scholar. She was a vibrant community leader. She worked to find support for the founding of a girls' dorm. She gave - and encouraged others to give - scholarships and grants. She even supported the launching of a theater company.



A trailblazing, self-effacing woman with an infamous propensity for absentmindedness, she was beloved by all who knew her - her family, friends, colleagues, and students. Her friendships with literati, her interactions with theater people and her boundless enthusiasm for travel shaped a colorful and exemplary life. Başak belongs to a remarkable generation of women, who have a deeply instilled love for Türkiye and a dedication to help the country develop - qualities she demonstrated till the very end.

Oya Başak's life teaches how art and literature can enrich a life and be the guiding light for creating meaning, not only for oneself, but also for one's outer circle, and, therefore, is a lesson on its own.

## Turkish Theater's Strong Voice: Genco Erkal RC 57

Genco Erkal's passing, on July 31, 2024, saddened art lovers in Türkiye. Here, friends and colleagues pay tribute to a life well-lived.

Genco Erkal devoted 65 years to theater. He breathed theater and poured life into our theater. Dostlar Theater, of which he was a founder, is now 55 years old.

Genco Erkal is one of Turkey's "political theater" pioneers. From Bertolt Brecht to especially Nazım Hikmet, he urged in all his plays an essential aspect of life: "Respect for human dignity, respect for human rights."

Through his rational reflections on issues of war and peace, human rights, law and justice, he brought to light the points of concern and questions regarding the system and the society in which he lived.


### Nedim Saban RC 86: "Erkal Was a Role Model for Me"

Erkal was a significant role model for me during my youth. In my amateur theater days, he welcomed me into using his theater space, giving me the chance to hold rehearsals for my street theater performances.

Upon returning from the United States after completing my theater studies, I established my own theater, but for a long time, we only knew each other as acquaintances. However, after Genco Erkal lost his mother, my grandmother, who was a close friend of hers, felt a deep sadness over the loss. This shared experience led to the development of a friendship between us. Until the pandemic, we frequently met to work on my doctoral thesis and a documentary about Robert College. He is terribly missed.

I was very impressed with his interest and ability in acting. He became a very valuable member of RC Players. RC definitely had a very important

Stop the World I Want to Get Off (Durdurun Dünyayı İnecek Var) was where we first met. Genco was already a name in theater and I was new. It was a huge hit, and we went on tours all around Turkey. Genco was an extraordinary teacher. He was also a very good comedian, but he tended towards the political. Stop the World wasn't so political but he adopted it to Turkey and made it so.

We didn't act together again, but I've seen all his plays. Genco was cool, an intellectual, he was always reading. On stage he was a huge actor.

I like the way he thought, his poetry, the way he looked after himself. I heard he wanted to tour up to the last day. That was Genco.


Margaret Hospital in 1967, contributing to advancements in nuclear medicine and lymphoscintigraphy.

#### Mehmet Bekir Şasa RA 61



#### Eric Widmer, Trustee Emeritus

Former member of the RC Board, Eric Widmer died on January 18, 2025, in Simsbury, Connecticut. He had a special connection to RC, as the great-grandson of Cyrus Hamlin, and like his ancestor, dedicated his life to education.

Widmer was born on the American University of Beirut campus, where his parents were on the faculty. With German forces threatening the Middle East, his mother brought him to the US (his father remained, to fight with the Free French). Widmer attended Deerfield Academy, Williams College, and Harvard University, where he received a PhD in Chinese History. His first book, with Harvard University Press, was a study of early Russian-Chinese diplomatic relations. In 1969,



he came to Brown University, where he was Assistant Professor of Chinese History, then Dean of Student Life, then Dean of Admissions. In 1994, he returned to Deerfield as its 54th headmaster. Naturally, he responded when a Deerfield graduate, King Abdullah of Jordan, asked for advice

to start a progressive boarding school in Jordan. Their friendly consultation turned into a consuming passion, and when King Abdullah asked Widmer to become the founding headmaster of King's Academy, he accepted. In a sense, it was a chance to return home, to the region of his birth. King's Academy was an immediate success, and continues to thrive nearly two decades later. Eric Widmer is survived by his wife, Meera Viswanathan (the head of the Ethel Walker School), by his first wife, Ellen Widmer (the Mayling Soong Professor of Chinese Studies at Wellesley College), by his sons, Ted (also a board member), Matt, and by his grandson Freddy.
